A type of metaphor that draws comparisons refers more generally to figurative language but does not specify the part-whole relationship central to synecdoche. An analytical approach to character identities pertains to literary analysis rather than being a figure of speech. A common theme within multiple works refers to motifs or overarching ideas across literature, which is unrelated to the concept of synecdoche.

To emphasize involves giving special importance or prominence to a particular idea or point, rather than explaining it through examples. Refining refers to the process of improving or clarifying something, usually by removing imperfections, and doesn't specifically focus on the use of examples or details.*
