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1. In what century was Geoffrey Chaucer born?

Option D is incorrect because it is a century later than the correct answer. Therefore, option C is the best answer given Chaucer's historical context.

Walt Whitman is considered one of the most important poets in American literature of the 19th century, and he is particularly known for his collection of poems called "Leaves of Grass." Option C, Saxon Poet, is a better explanation as it refers to the appropriate time period and cultural context in which Beowulf was written.

Great Expectations was published in 1861, not 1845, 1848, or 1865. While these years may fall within Dickens's lifetime, they are not the specific year of publication for this novel.
