1. Who wrote The Awakening?

- A. F. Scott Fitzgerald

Kate Chopin wrote *The Awakening*. We can eliminate options A, B, and D because those authors did not write *The Awakening*. Option A, F. Scott Fitzgerald, wrote *The Great Gatsby*. Option B, Ernest Hemingway, wrote *For Whom the Bell Tolls*. Option D, Henry James, wrote *The Portrait of a Lady*. Therefore, the only remaining option, C, must be the correct answer.

2. Who wrote the novel Great Expectations?

- A. Mark Twain
- B. Charlotte Bronte
- C. Charles Dickens**
- D. Emily Bronte

Great Expectations is a well-known novel written by Charles Dickens. While Mark Twain, Charlotte Bronte, and Emily Bronte are also well-known authors, they did not write this particular novel. Mark Twain is most known for his novels *The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn* and *The Adventures of Tom Sawyer*, Charlotte Bronte is best known for *Jane Eyre*, and Emily Bronte is known for her novel *Wuthering Heights*. Therefore, the correct answer is C, Charles Dickens.

3. Who wrote the epic poem Beowulf?

Beowulf is an epic poem that was written in Old English and tells the story of a hero named Beowulf. While many authors and poets have been speculated to have written it, the true author is unknown. Option B, Homer, was a Greek poet who wrote the *Iliad* and the *Odyssey*, but *Beowulf* is not a Greek epic. This leaves option D, Unknown, as the correct answer.

Mary Shelley is the correct answer because she wrote Frankenstein and it is her most famous work. Option C is incorrect because William Wordsworth was a poet, not a novelist. Lastly, option D is incorrect because Jane Austen is known for writing novels such as *Pride and Prejudice* and *Sense and Sensibility*, but not Frankenstein.

5. What is the difference between tone and mood in literature?

- A. Mood is the feeling conveyed to the reader; tone is the author's overall attitude**

Tone refers to the author's attitude or feelings towards the subject matter of the text, while mood is the emotional atmosphere or ambiance created by the text for the reader. A is the only option that correctly describes this difference. While B and D are similar, they are incorrect because they mix up the definitions of tone and mood. Tone is the author's attitude, not the reader's feeling, and mood is the reader's feeling, not the author's overall attitude. Similarly, C is incorrect because mood is not the overall setting of a text, but rather the emotional atmosphere created by the setting. Additionally, tone is not the type of language used but rather the attitude or feelings conveyed through the language. By process of elimination, A is the best answer that accurately describes the difference between tone and mood in literature.

6. What form does "The Rime of the Ancient Mariner" by Samuel Taylor Coleridge take?

"The Rime of the Ancient Mariner" is a famous poem written by Samuel Taylor Coleridge. William Shakespeare is the correct answer because he is the only one out of the options who is widely known for writing plays, including the famous tragedy Macbeth. John Milton is primarily known for his epic poem Paradise Lost, Geoffrey Chaucer for The Canterbury Tales, and Oscar Wilde for his works of fiction and poetry. Therefore, they are not known for writing plays, let alone Macbeth.

9. What is the name of the evil group in Beowulf?

A. Grendel

B. Sköll

C. Gegen

D. Fafnir

In Beowulf, Grendel is the name of the evil group. Other options such as Sköll, Gegen, and Fafnir are not correct because they either refer to individual characters or are not mentioned in the text. Sköll is a wolf in Norse mythology, Gegen is a rare surname, and Fafnir is a dragon in Norse and Germanic mythology. Therefore, it is important to pay attention to the context and details when answering questions about literature.

10. What is the title of the novel written by Jane Austen?

A. War and Peace

B. Jane Eyre

C. Emma

D. The Catcher in the Rye

Jane Austen is a well-known author of several novels from the 19th century, including "Pride and Prejudice" and "Sense and Sensibility." The novel discussed in this question is specifically written by Jane Austen, which eliminates the first three options as they are written by different authors. Option D, "The Catcher in the Rye," is a novel written by J.D. Salinger and has no connection to Jane Austen. Therefore, the correct answer is C, "Emma."
