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## **Explanations**

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### 1. Which word means excessive pride?

- A. Disabuse
- B. Loquacious
- C. Insouciance
- D. Hubris**

Hubris is the term for excessive pride or arrogant overconfidence. It carries the sense of overestimating oneself or defying limits, often with consequences, which is exactly what “excessive pride” conveys. In literature and everyday use, hubris captures that pushy, overbearing self-importance that goes beyond reasonable esteem. Disabuse means to correct a mistaken belief, loquacious means very talkative, and insouciance means a casual, unconcerned attitude. None of these express the idea of pride that is excessively or dangerously inflated, so hubris fits best.

### 2. Which term means absolute certainty or conviction?

The idea here is choosing a word that expresses how sure someone is, to the point of being unshakable. The term that exactly captures absolute certainty or conviction is certitude. It’s a noun that conveys a firm, unambiguous belief, often without any doubt. For example, you might say, “She spoke with certitude about the plan succeeding,” which shows her conviction is clear and unwavering. Doubt refers to not being sure, and uncertainty is a lack of definite knowledge, both implying some level of wavering. Suspicion is more about a feeling that something might be wrong or untrustworthy, not a firm belief. So, certitude is the best fit for expressing complete, unwavering certainty.

The idea here is a verb that means to make something unclear on purpose. Obfuscate fits because it describes deliberately muddling or obscuring information so it’s hard to understand. You’ll see it used when someone hides meaning behind vague language or confusing jargon, like saying, “The spokesperson obfuscated the policy details with ambiguous terms.” That sense is what sets it apart from the others. Refute and confute both mean to argue against or prove something false, not to hide or confuse information. Rueful describes feeling regret or sorrow, not a deliberate act of confusing. So obfuscate is the one that matches the idea of disguising clarity on purpose.

#### 4. Which term means relating to teaching methods?

Relating to teaching methods is described by the adjective pedagogical. It comes from pedagogy, the study and practice of teaching, and is used to talk about the ways instruction is delivered—pedagogical strategies, pedagogical approaches, etc. The other terms are close but not as precise: pedagogy is the field itself, educational is broader and about education in general, and didactic describes instruction in a teaching sense but often with a tone of being overly instructional rather than the method itself.

#### 5. Which term describes language that is pompous and overblown yet conceals a lack of ideas?

Language that is pompous and overblown yet hides a lack of ideas is described as bombastic. The idea is that the wording sounds grand and impressive, using inflated phrases and ornate style to create the illusion of importance, even when the underlying content isn't substantial. The emphasis is on the voice and how it sounds, not on presenting solid reasoning or evidence. That's why this word fits best: it specifically flags grandiose language that's more about style than substance. In contrast, humble conveys modesty, lucid means clear and easy to understand, and terse means brief and to the point—none of these capture the inflated, content-light flavor of bombastic.

#### 6. Which word means to think deeply about something?

The idea being tested is choosing a word that means thinking deeply about something. Ruminare captures that exact sense: to ponder, reflect, or meditate on a matter at length, often turning the idea over in your mind like chewing cud. It carries a sense of careful, thorough consideration. The other words describe different ideas: catatonic refers to a state of unresponsiveness or immobility, gauche means socially awkward or lacking tact, and affable means friendly and easy to talk to. So ruminare is the best fit for describing deep, extended thought. Use it when you want to convey deliberate, ongoing contemplation, as in "She ruminated on the decision for days."

7. Which word means 'impossible to overcome' (a difficulty)?

A difficulty that cannot be overcome is described by insuperable. This word captures the idea of obstacles or problems that are so great or so persistent that they can't be conquered or surpassed. It suggests a sense of finality in the challenge, something that stands firm against any effort to overcome it. The root idea comes from overcome, with the prefix in- giving the sense of not being able to overcome. Other options miss that specific sense: credulous means gullible or too trusting; stonewalling means to block or obstruct, often to delay; portmanteau is a blended word formed from parts of two or more words. None of these convey the notion of a hurdle that cannot be surmounted, which is why insuperable is the best choice.

8. Which word is defined as speaking easily but without thinking carefully, often used to show disapproval?

Speaking easily but without thinking carefully, and often with a disapproving note, is captured by glib. Glib describes fluent, smooth talk that sounds convincing but is shallow or insincere, suggesting the speaker hasn't given real thought to what they're saying. The other words don't fit this sense: taciturn means rarely speaking or very reserved; esoteric means understood only by a small, specialized group; nascent means just beginning to develop. So glib is the best choice because it combines effortless speech with a critical, dismissive impression.

9. Which word describes 'fast and energetic in a wild, uncontrolled way'?

- A. Austere
- B. Frenetic**
- C. Prescient
- D. Oblique

The idea tested is identifying a word that describes fast, energetic action taken in a wild, unrestrained way. Frenetic captures that sense: it means extremely energetic and frenzied, often chaotic or out of control. This makes it the best fit for something described as fast and energetic in a wild, uncontrolled manner. For example, a frenetic burst of activity in a crowded marketplace conveys both speed and unruly energy. Austere points to strictness or minimalism and doesn't convey energy. Prescient describes foresight about future events, not movement or energy. Oblique means indirect or not straightforward, lacking the sense of wild, rapid action.

**10. The quality of being frank and honest is called what?**

**Candour is the quality of speaking frankly and openly. It conveys directness, sincerity, and a lack of pretense in what you say, often about difficult topics, without sugarcoating. Honesty is a broader trait—being truthful in general—while candour focuses on the manner of speaking, the clear and straightforward delivery. Veracity relates to truthfulness or factual accuracy, emphasizing whether something is true rather than how openly it’s spoken. Guile is the opposite, meaning deceit or cunning. So the best match for “the quality of being frank and honest” is candour (candor). Example: “She spoke with candour about the challenges we faced.”**
