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Explanations

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1. A statement that is absolutely true and beyond argument is called what?

- A. Prescient

The other options don't fit the sense of surviving or existing: immutable means unchanging, felicity means happiness, and proclivity means a natural tendency.

The concept here is naming the profession that uses statistics to assess insurance risk. They build models that analyze factors like mortality rates, claim frequencies, and future cash flows to estimate probabilities and financial outcomes. For example, when pricing a life insurance policy, the actuary estimates life expectancy and the chance of a claim to set premiums that cover expected costs. The others are unrelated: dyspeptic means stomach discomfort, fealty is loyalty, and ruminant means to think deeply or to chew cud.

Extreme patriotism in foreign policy is described by the term jingoistic. Urbane means refined and sophisticated, which isn't about political attitudes; invective is harsh, abusive language; nebulous means vague. So jingoistic best captures the idea of an aggressive, unquestioning patriotism in foreign policy.

Language that is pompous and overblown yet hides a lack of ideas is described as bombastic. That's why this word fits best: it specifically flags grandiose language that's more about style than substance.
