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Explanations

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1. How would you measure latency and jitter in the EPD Pilot, and why are these metrics important?

- A. Track one-way latency only

Measuring latency and jitter centers on understanding how responsive and stable the system is during real use. The best approach is to track round-trip times and how much they vary. Round-trip latency captures the total time for a message to go to the remote end and back, which aligns with what users experience in interactive apps and doesn't require perfectly synchronized clocks. Jitter, the variation in those times, matters because even small fluctuations can degrade real-time performance and user experience. Together, these metrics reveal both typical delay and the stability of that delay, helping you diagnose congestion, queueing, or path issues and verify you meet real-time constraints in the EPD Pilot environment. Why not the other options? One-way latency relies on clock synchronization and can miss asymmetries or the actual end-user experience. Ignoring jitter assumes constant delays, which isn't realistic in most networks. Measuring only CPU cycles misses the network transit time entirely and won't reflect how the system performs in practice.

When the situation involves a non-dangerous animal causing a traffic hazard, the response should focus on protecting the public while safely removing the animal, using a protocol that emphasizes coordination with animal control and controlled traffic management. Protocol 132 is designed for this exact scenario: it guides responders to secure the area, alert and involve trained animal control or wildlife services, set up warning signs or barriers to slow and divert traffic, and avoid attempting risky direct interaction with the animal. The goal is to remove the animal with trained personnel and minimal risk, then clear the scene once the hazard is resolved. Other protocols cover different kinds of emergencies or higher-risk situations, such as dangerous animals needing immediate containment or other hazards that require specialized personnel and procedures. Those would not be appropriate for a non-dangerous animal on a roadway, where the emphasis is on safe traffic control and professional wildlife removal.

In incident responses, the immediate focus is on safety and control: protect everyone involved, and stop the threat. The four priorities are about minimizing harm to officers and the public, and quickly resolving the danger by apprehending the suspect. Medical evacuation, while essential for care, isn't counted among those primary priorities because arranging medical treatment is handled by EMS and comes after scene safety and threat neutralization are established. So Medical Evacuation is not among the four incident priorities. The other priorities fit because they directly address protecting people and ending the threat.

Handling domestic disturbance and violence in marital or intimate relationships centers on safety, victim support, and the specific dynamics of a home environment. The protocol designated for Domestic Disturbance/Violence is tailored to these situations, guiding responders through risk assessment, keeping everyone safe, documenting injuries, collecting evidence, and coordinating protective orders or referrals to support services. Because the scenario involves intimate partnerships, this protocol provides the targeted guidance needed to address the risks and needs unique to domestic violence. The other protocols cover different incident types and do not focus on domestic violence within intimate relationships, so they aren't the right fit for this context.

Protocol 122 Miscellaneous is used for nonstandard field incidents that don't fit into other chief complaint protocols. It covers external situations that require a response but aren't tied to a specific category—like weather-generated calls for service, issues involving unauthorized immigrants, and municipal ordinance infractions not addressed by another protocol. Administrative tasks, however, are internal duties and routine paperwork, not field calls or incidents to respond to. They don't represent a situation encountered in the field, so they don't belong under Miscellaneous. That's why administrative tasks are the non-example.

When assessing safety, the key idea is labeling animals by the level of risk they pose to people and other animals. An animal described as dangerous is one that, by its type or behavior, could cause death or serious injury. That makes the term dangerous animals the best fit, because it directly communicates the potential for severe harm to people, livestock, or domestic animals. Aggressive species isn't a formal safety term in many contexts and focuses more on observed aggression than on overall risk. Hazardous animals isn't a common or precise label for this purpose, and Threatened Wildlife refers to conservation status (risk of extinction) rather than the danger they pose to humans or domestic animals.

The main aim of a protocol pilot is to validate end-to-end interoperability, reliability, and safety of the communications in a controlled, real-world-like environment. In the EPD Protocol Pilot, this means testing how different EPD devices and systems communicate with each other, how reliably they behave under realistic conditions, and whether safety requirements are met before any broader rollout. This controlled testing helps uncover integration issues, performance concerns, and safety risks early, so vendors can address them and the protocol can be refined. It is not about deploying straight into production networks, nor is it focused only on hardware performance or on publishing theory without practical testing.

Reproducible test results come from locking down exactly what was run and under what conditions. When configurations are kept in version control, you capture the precise version of every setting, along with who changed it and when. Pairing that with traceable IDs for each test run, data set, and environment component lets you link every result back to the exact inputs and conditions that produced it. With these in place, you can recreate the same test by checking out the same configuration version, using the same data, and running in the same environment, then compare results across runs to verify consistency. This approach prevents drift that happens with ad hoc setups, missing documentation, or changes to the environment between runs. Spontaneous setups and random changes make it impossible to know exactly what was used, so you can't reliably reproduce results or diagnose differences.

Confidentiality in a data protocol environment is achieved by encryption, which turns readable data into unreadable ciphertext that can only be decrypted by someone with the proper key. Protocols like TLS protect data in transit between parties, so interceptors can't read the content, and end-to-end encryption ensures only the communicating endpoints can decrypt the payload, even if intermediaries handle the data. Compression is about reducing size, not hiding content. Increasing message size doesn't secure content, and masking IP addresses addresses only metadata visibility, not the actual message payload.

The main idea here is that domestic and family violence can escalate at any moment, not just on a schedule or after a specific event. Danger can intensify unpredictably due to various triggers—such as attempts to separate, threats, access to weapons, or substance use—and can occur even when things seemed calm previously. This is why ongoing vigilance and safety planning are essential, and why disclosures or concerns should always be taken seriously. Because of this persistent and potentially sudden risk, the statement is true.
