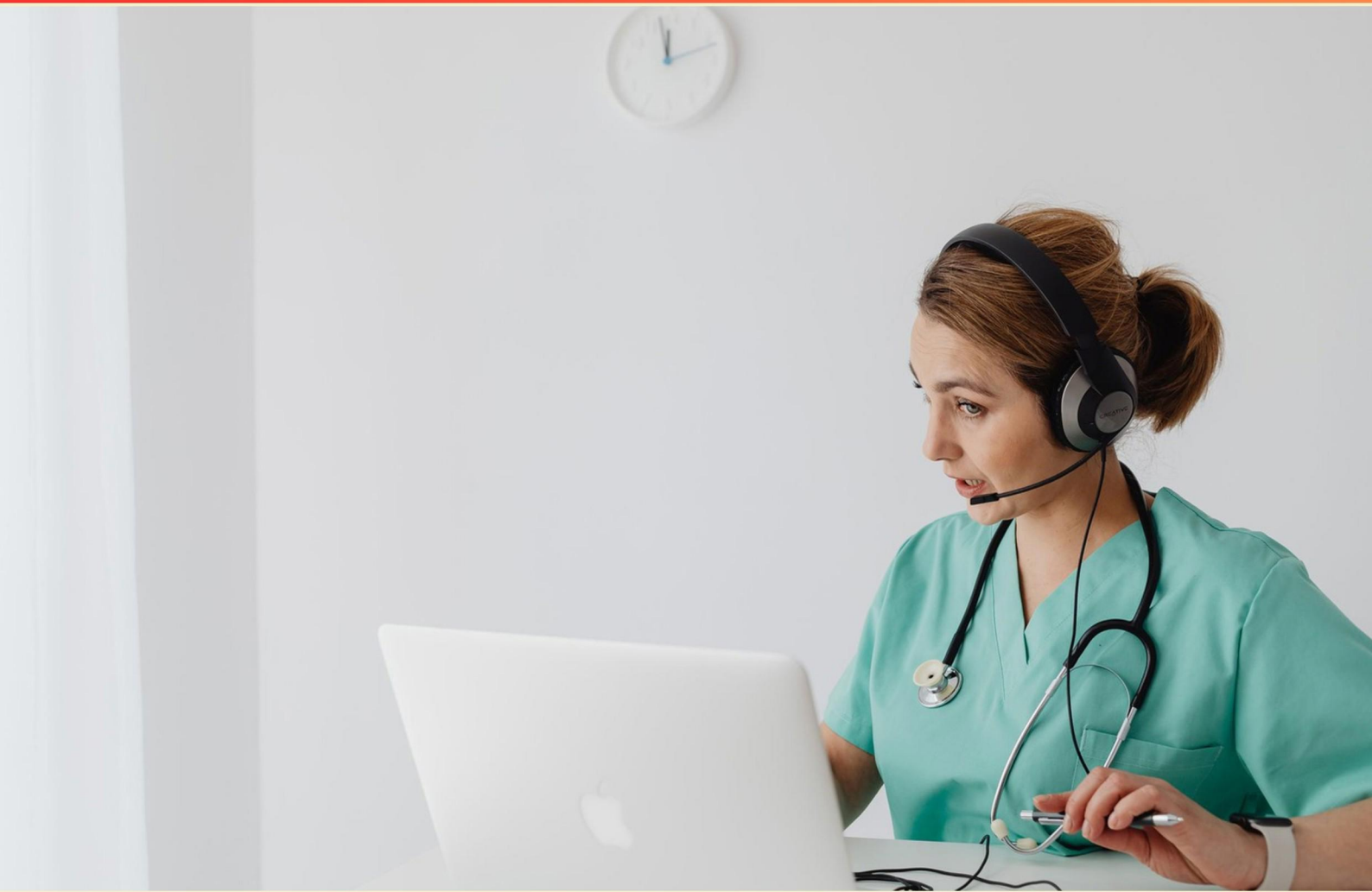

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Explanations

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1. Which mechanisms influence data elements included in Care Everywhere CCDAs exchanges?

Care Everywhere CCDAs exchanges are shaped by a combination of consent settings, data-sharing policies, and mapping/templating controls. Consent settings decide what a patient has authorized for sharing, potentially restricting certain data elements from being exchanged. Data-sharing policies encode organizational or regulatory rules about what data can be shared, with whom, and under what circumstances. Mapping and templating controls determine how the EHR data is translated into the CCDAs structure: which data elements are included, how they are organized into sections, and how fields map to the CCDAs template. When you put these together, you can see that all three mechanisms influence exactly which data elements appear in a CCDAs exchange.

When duplicates are detected across exchanges, the system aims to unify them into a single canonical patient record after matching and stewardship review. The idea is to create one authoritative view of the patient that all connected providers can rely on, instead of having several separate records for the same person. First, potential duplicates are identified using matching logic that compares identifiers, demographics, and sometimes clinical data to determine likely matches. Once a match is found, a canonical record is formed, but human oversight—stewardship review—is involved to verify accuracy, resolve any conflicts, and ensure privacy and consent considerations are respected before the merge. After the merge, data from the individual source records is consolidated into the canonical record, with provenance preserved so it's clear where each piece of information came from and how it's been updated over time. This approach reduces duplicates, ensures a complete and consistent patient history, and improves patient safety across exchanges. The other options don't fit because duplicates aren't simply duplicated across the system, they're reconciled; they aren't automatically discarded, and they aren't merged with random data.

When endpoints are misconfigured—wrong address, mismatched authentication, incorrect port or protocol, or improper integration profile—the connection cannot be established or data cannot be routed securely and accurately. That blocks the entire setup and prevents any exchange from happening, even if everything else looks fine. Inaccurate patient gender is a data quality issue, not a setup problem. Slow network performance can affect how data moves once a connection is live, but it isn't the common setup failure mode. Missing user training can lead to operational errors after deployment, but it doesn't reflect the technical misconfiguration that blocks establishing Care Everywhere communication.

If a breach occurs, the Breach Notification Rule requires timely notification to affected individuals, the Department of Health and Human Services, and sometimes the media, with timelines defined by law. In addition, applicable state laws may add stricter requirements or additional protections beyond HIPAA. Because Care Everywhere involves a vendor handling PHI on behalf of a covered entity, a Business Associate Agreement is required. The BAA ensures the vendor implements HIPAA-compliant safeguards, defines permissible disclosures, and outlines breach reporting responsibilities. GDPR would come into play only if EU data subjects are involved, and FERPA applies to student education records rather than general PHI. So the governing framework is HIPAA along with state law considerations and the Business Associate Agreement.
