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Explanations

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1. According to Holland's and Roe's theories, when is job satisfaction predicted to be highest?

- A. When there is a personality-job environment match**

These theories emphasize person-environment fit as the driver of job satisfaction. Holland's approach says people are happiest when the job environment aligns with their dominant personality type, creating a high overall congruence between self and work. When this match is strong, tasks feel meaningful, energizing, and well-suited to the individual, boosting satisfaction. Roe's perspective adds that individuals seek environments that fulfill their psychological needs and preferences; a good match between personality and work environment satisfies these needs and reduces frustration, leading to greater satisfaction. So, the highest job satisfaction occurs when there is a clear personality-environment match. High salary or job security can help, but they don't compensate for a poor fit, and enjoying work without alignment with personality tends to yield less satisfaction than a good fit.

Supportive management builds trust, psychological safety, and clear expectations, which helps a group work together effectively. When leaders back the team, provide needed resources, recognize effort, and remove obstacles, members feel valued and are more willing to share information, coordinate actions, and stay aligned on common goals. That cohesion translates into smoother communication, better problem solving, and sustained effort, boosting productivity. Having ample budget helps, but money alone doesn't create the social glue that makes a group cohesive. Autocratic leadership often reduces input and trust, which can break cohesion and lower productivity. Diversity can enhance problem-solving, but without a supportive climate to foster inclusion and shared norms, cohesion may suffer; with supportive leadership, diverse teams can be highly productive.

Conventional personality types gravitate toward structured, rule-governed work that is data-centered and detail-focused. They prefer tasks that involve organizing information, following established procedures, and maintaining accuracy. Manipulating data fits this leaning because it centers on handling numbers, records, and data processes in a precise and methodical way. Leading teams requires interpersonal leadership and coordination, which align more with Enterprising or Social types. Designing products involves creativity and conceptual work, typical of Artistic or Investigative types. Teaching others involves instructional interaction and helping people, a hallmark of the Social type. So, manipulating data is the best match for the Conventional profile.

The stage where findings are presented to clients to decide what to do next is the feedback stage. This phase centers on translating findings into decisions and gaining client buy-in for the next actions. The entry phase is about getting started and establishing the engagement, the diagnosis phase focuses on analyzing and identifying problems, and the evaluation phase looks at how well actions work after they're implemented.

5. Which parenting style is NOT listed in Roe's Fields & Levels Theory?

In Roe's Fields & Levels Theory, parenting styles are defined as Acceptant, Avoidant, and Overprotective. Authoritarian isn't part of that framework; it comes from a different theory (Baumrind's typology). So the style that isn't listed in Roe's scheme is Authoritarian, which is why that option is the correct answer. Acceptant, Avoidant, and Overprotective each map to Roe's categories (warmth/acceptance and involvement with varying levels of protective control), whereas Authoritarian represents a different labeling system altogether.

Consideration in leadership is about being people-oriented: showing genuine concern for subordinates, building positive relationships, offering support, and fostering open communication. The other options emphasize focusing on tasks, production, strategic planning, or risk and compliance, which relate more to getting work done or managing systems rather than prioritizing interpersonal relationships.

Growth needs are about personal development, mastering new skills, and realizing one's potential. In ERG theory, existence covers material and safety needs, and relatedness covers social connections; self-actualization is not a separate category but is encompassed within growth. So growth opportunities best satisfy the growth need by enabling development, achievement, and self-improvement.

Realistic type is about preference for practical, hands-on work with the physical world. The statement that best captures this is preferring working with tools and machinery, because it directly describes engaging with equipment, fixing or building things, and solving concrete mechanical problems. Realistic individuals typically avoid purely abstract tasks or heavy social interaction and instead enjoy operating tools, maintaining equipment, and working outdoors. The other statements describe traits more aligned with different types: social advocacy aligns with helping people and teamwork; developing artistic expression reflects creativity; pursuing scientific research with math reflects analytical, investigative work.

9. Holland's and Roe's theories predict that job satisfaction will be greatest when there is a

The key idea is person-environment fit. Holland's theory says people seek work environments that match their dominant personality type, and satisfaction is highest when the job environment aligns with that type. Roe's theory adds that satisfaction comes from an environment that lets a person fulfill their core needs and preferences, which also depends on how well the job setting fits the individual. When the work environment matches who you are and what you need, tasks feel meaningful, autonomy and competence feel supported, and turnover and dissatisfaction drop. So, even if a job offers high pay, a short commute, or generous vacation, those perks don't guarantee the most satisfaction if the environment doesn't align with the person's preferences. The strongest predictor here is the fit between the person and the job environment.

Holland's Realistic type centers on practical, physical, hands-on work with objects and machines. People described this way tend to prefer tasks that involve tools, machinery, and concrete, real-world activities—often outdoors or in technical settings—rather than abstract theory or extensive interaction with others. Preferring to work with tools and machinery fits this emphasis on manual, tangible work. It reflects a comfort with manipulating physical equipment and solving practical problems through hands-on action. The other descriptions point to different Holland types: analytic, precise, and curious align with Investigative work that involves abstract reasoning and problem solving; enjoying working with others fits the Social type, which is people-oriented; and being creative, introspective, and non-conforming aligns with the Artistic type, which emphasizes individual expression and nontraditional approaches.
