1. What is Mr. Lemoncello's function in the story?

The main idea is that Mr. Lemoncello serves as both the host of the library game and a mentor who guides—and sometimes tests—the players. He organizes and runs the elaborate competition inside his library, setting up the challenges and keeping the game moving, which makes him the host. At the same time, his role goes beyond just presenting puzzles: he designs twists and hints that push players to think creatively, work together, and show integrity. He uses the game to teach lessons and push characters to grow, not simply to win. He isn't just a librarian or a museum guide; he's the creator of the game and the guiding figure behind the experience, shaping how the kids approach the challenges.

2. In what city and state is the story set?

Understanding setting means knowing exactly where the story happens, including the city and state. The events in this story take place at the Lemoncello Library in Columbus, Ohio, so that city and state are the correct setting. The other options change either the town name or the state, which doesn't fit the details given in the text. To verify, look for explicit mentions of the location in the story's opening or in clues about the library and neighborhood.

3. What is the title of the book mentioned in the material?

Identifying the exact title mentioned in the material helps you show you paid attention to the text. The other options do not fit because they are not the title cited in the material, even though they might sound plausible or resemble parts of the series.

Mr. Lemoncello is the library's owner and the designer of the whole project. He's the eccentric game-maker who builds the high-tech, puzzle-filled library and launches the big competition inside it. The story frames him as the mastermind behind the library—funding, creating, and presenting the challenges for the contestants—so his role as owner and designer is the best fit. He isn't just a rival contestant, nor the librarian who keeps the day-to-day shelves running, nor the security chief; those other roles belong to different characters or functions within the library setting.

5. Identify a literary device used in the story.

Recognizing how a setting can carry meaning and hint at future events is what this item is testing. In the story, the library is more than just a place where things happen; it stands as a symbol of knowledge—the idea that curiosity, learning, and exploration are valuable in themselves. That's symbolism: the library represents a bigger concept beyond its literal function. At the same time, the narrative drops clues about what may come next—small details or patterns that hint at future steps or outcomes—which is foreshadowing. Together, these devices show how the author uses the setting to convey meaning and build anticipation. Irony would involve a contrast between what's expected and what actually occurs; a metaphor would be a direct comparison using one thing as another; and an allegory would present an extended, overarching moral or political meaning. While those may appear in some contexts, the combination of symbolic meaning in the library and forecasted hints about future events best fits this item.

6. Which person announced the prize for the twelve winners?

The moment tests recognizing who delivers the official prize announcement. In the ceremony after the challenges, the person who steps up to the microphone and declares the prize for the twelve winners is Dr. Zinchenko. He's presented as the authority tied to presenting the prize, making his announcement the formal, ceremonial moment. The other characters—Kyle, Mrs. Tobin, and Rose Vernette—have different roles in the story and do not make that announcement. So the best answer is the one who is described as delivering the prize news to everyone.

7. Which of the following is true about the twelve-year-olds extra-credit essay?

Think about what the assignment is asking for: a twelve-year-old's extra-credit essay about the new public library. The best topic is the one that asks for a personal reflection on why someone is excited about that library. It fits the setting and purpose of the situation, inviting a student to share their feelings and what the library means to them. Why this topic stands out: it directly ties to the moment in the story—the opening or impact of the new public library—and it invites a personal response, which is exactly what an extra-credit essay in this context would be about. The other topics would shift away from personal reflection about the library: a favorite movie is not connected to the library opening, a history of Alexandriaville is about factual history rather than personal feelings, and how to design a library focuses on technical design topics rather than a student's excitement.

8. What is the name of the book on the bedside table in Mr. Lemoncello's private suite?

The key idea is noticing a specific literary reference tucked into the setting, which the book uses to connect themes of curiosity and problem-solving. The bedside table in Mr. Lemoncello's private suite features *From the Mixed-Up Files of Mrs. Basil E. Frankweiler*. This classic about two kids who delve into a mystery in the museum fits the library-adventure mood of the story and signals a deliberate nod to well-known children's literature. The other titles are recognizable, but they aren't the book shown in that scene, so they don't match the clue as it's described.

9. Where did Haley put the memory box?

- A. In the Security Office**
- B. Under the Librarian's Desk**
- C. Down in the Stacks**
- D. In Haley's Backpack**

The idea is to pinpoint where a character hides a item within a scene by paying attention to the setting and actions described. Haley places the memory box down in the stacks, among the shelves of books. The stacks are a natural hiding place in a library—quiet, out of the way, and full of nooks where something can be tucked away during a fast-moving moment in a game. It wouldn't be in the Security Office or at the Librarian's Desk because those are public, supervised spaces, and Haley wouldn't stash something there where others could notice or secure it. Carrying it in Haley's Backpack would also expose the box rather than conceal it, which wouldn't fit a moment where she's trying to keep it hidden. So the memory box ends up down in the stacks.

10. Which statement best reflects the relationship described in the material?

- A. They are contrasted by their actions in pursuit of winning**
- B. They had identical approaches to winning**
- C. They both avoided competition**
- D. They valued winning and took different actions**

When two characters are described as aiming for the same outcome but choosing different paths to get there, the relationship is about shared value with divergent methods. The best statement reflects that both care about winning, yet they pursue it through different actions. That nuance fits a scene where one might rely on strategy while the other takes a bolder or different approach, showing harmony in the goal but variety in approach. The other options don't fit because they either imply identical methods, avoidance of competition, or a simple contrast in actions without acknowledging the common goal.
