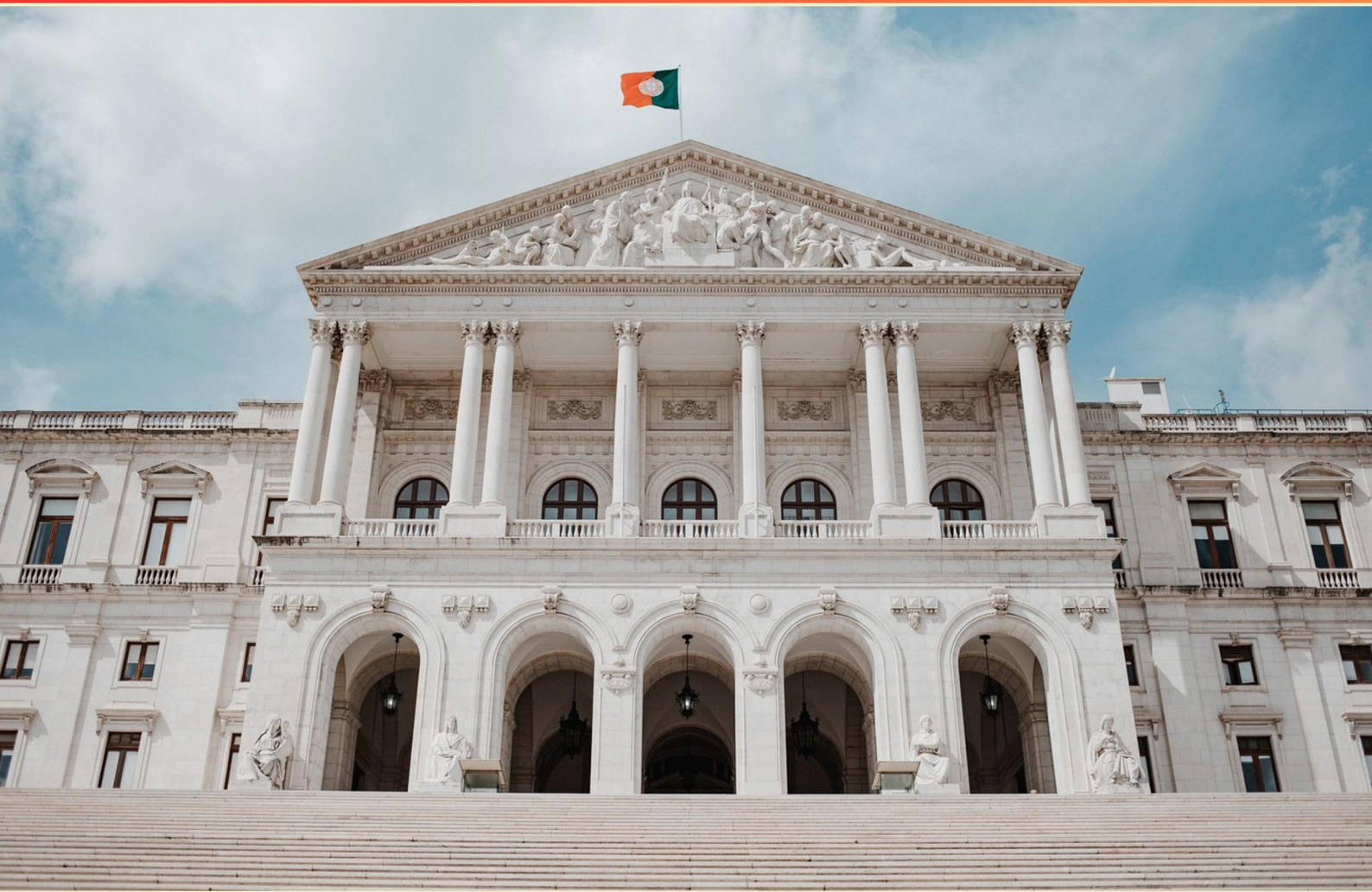

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Explanations

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1. Who was the only President to ever resign from office?

- A. Richard Nixon

Richard Nixon is recognized as the only President in U.S. history to resign from office, which he did on August 8, 1974, amid the Watergate scandal. His resignation was a significant moment in American political history, marking the first time a sitting President has stepped down before completing a term. Thus, the Executive Branch is the correct answer as it clearly encapsulates the responsibilities and leadership role of the President.
