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Explanations

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1. Who is the author of Romans?

A. The Apostle Paul

B. Luke

C. Peter

D. John

The author is the Apostle Paul. Romans opens with Paul's own identification as the writer—"Paul, a servant of Christ Jesus, called to be an apostle, set apart for the gospel of God"—which directly shows who penned the letter and to whom it was addressed. This aligns with Paul's usual pattern in his epistles and matches the historical view of his missionary work, including his aim to present and explain the gospel to both Jews and Gentiles. Luke, Peter, and John are known for their respective writings (Luke-Acts, Peter's letters, and John's gospel and Revelation), which carry different opening cues and purposes, so the internal evidence in Romans points clearly to Paul as the author.

The main concept tested here is that Romans 6–8 develop life in the Spirit as the experiential outcome of justification, empowering believers to overcome sin. In Romans 6, Paul shows believers are united with Christ in his death and resurrection, so they are dead to sin and alive to God, symbolized by baptism. This sets the pattern for a transformed life, not simply a legal status. In Romans 7, the struggle with sin under the law exposes the inability of the old approach to deliver true righteousness, heightening the need for a new power. Romans 8 then focuses on the Spirit's indwelling, which enables believers to live righteously, overcome the flesh, and experience assurance, adoption, and intercession by the Spirit. Taken together, these chapters move from justification to a present, empowered life—a life led by the Spirit that overcomes sin. The other choices don't fit this central message. The theme of temple sacrifices or old covenant rituals isn't what Romans 6–8 centers on, and the history of Paul's missionary journeys is addressed more in Acts and his letters' biographical notes rather than the experiential life of the believer in the Spirit.

The event described as the Rapture is portrayed as a sudden, unseen gathering of believers to meet Christ in the air, without any preceding heavenly signs. Scripture like 1 Thessalonians 4:16–17 speaks of the Lord descending from heaven with a trumpet, the dead in Christ rising, and those who are alive being caught up to meet the Lord in the air. There's no mention of celestial events or heavenly omens signaling this moment; the trumpet is the announced signal, not a prophetic sign in the heavens. By contrast, the celestial signs people often hear about belong to the broader pattern of Christ's return to earth at the end of the Tribulation, not to the Rapture itself. So the correct idea is that there are no signs in heaven accompanying the Rapture.

4. What does the term Prevent mean in the material?

The meaning being tested is how the term prevent is used in older or biblical English. In that usage, prevent means to go before, precede, or come in advance of something rather than to stop it. So the best fit is the sense of "go before or proceed," because the material is treating prevent as an action of preceding or paving the way, not hindering or delaying. The other ideas don't match that sense. Going after would be the opposite of preceding. Delaying suggests putting things off, which isn't the sense being used here. Stopping conveys a halt, which is the modern, hinder-focused meaning that this context isn't about. Understanding that older English usage helps you see why prevent here means to go before or proceed.

5. In 1 Corinthians, what major problem did Paul address with factionalism among believers?

At the heart of this question is the issue of unity within the church. Paul is addressing a split in the Corinthian congregation where people formed rival groups around human leaders—some claiming loyalty to Paul, others to Apollos, others to Cephas. He argues that such factionalism divides the body of Christ and distracts from the gospel. The point he makes is that Christ is not divided, and believers are baptized into one Spirit into one body, so allegiance should be to Christ, not to a particular teacher. Leaders are ministers through whom the faith came, but they are not the source of life or identity; God is the one who brings growth, while the church remains one because of its unity in Christ. This is why the correct answer highlights divisions and allegiance to different leaders as the major problem Paul tackled. Other issues, like disputes over dietary practices or speaking in tongues, appear in the letter, but they are separate concerns from the core problem of factionalism based on human loyalties.

6. During which missionary journey did Paul evangelize Thessalonica?

A. 2nd Missionary Journey

Paul evangelized Thessalonica during his second missionary journey. In Acts 17, Paul and Silas travel through Macedonia, stopping in Philippi first and then coming to Thessalonica, where they reasoned in the synagogue for several Sabbaths. Some Jews and God-fearing Greeks believed, but opposition arose and he had to leave for Berea. This sequence—Philippi, Thessalonica, Berea, then on to Athens and Corinth—belongs to the second journey, not the first, third, or fourth. Thessalonica serves as a clear example of his Macedonia team's work and their pattern of preaching in the synagogues and facing opposition.

7. When was James written?

The point this question tests is the likely time frame when James was written. The strongest match is a date around AD 45. This early dating fits the letter's audience and tone: it is addressed to "the twelve tribes scattered abroad," a phrase pointing to Jewish Christians in Jerusalem or the wider diaspora early in the church's life, before Gentile ministry became central. The style is practical wisdom, focusing on trials, proper speech, and everyday ethics rather than on doctrinal disputes that dominate later Pauline letters. There are no references to events that would anchor the text in a later period, such as the destruction of the temple or major Gentile controversies, which supports an earlier composition. Because of these cues, AD 45 is the best fit among the given options.

The passage presents spiritual warfare and the equipment God provides for believers to stand firm against spiritual forces of evil. The belt of truth anchors a life of integrity and alignment with God, the breastplate of righteousness guards conduct and devotion, and the feet fitted with the gospel of peace symbolize readiness to live out and proclaim good news. The shield of faith protects against doubts and attacks by trusting God, the helmet of salvation secures hope and assurance of deliverance, and the sword of the Spirit—the word of God—offers a means of active spiritual engagement. This imagery isn't about physical armor, politics, or prayer life alone; it's about daily reliance on divine resources and practicing truth, righteousness, faith, and Scripture under the Spirit's guidance to resist temptation and stand firm in the Christian life.

9. Why cannot the Spirit of God be removed before the Rapture?

The key idea is the permanent indwelling of the Holy Spirit in believers. When someone places faith in Christ, the Spirit takes up residence in that person and, in Scripture, is described as being joined to the believer eternally and sealing them as a guarantee of their inheritance. That spiritual union is not something temporary that could be undone before the Rapture. Because the Spirit has been united to believers forever and serves as the seal and guarantee of their salvation, He cannot be removed prior to the Rapture. The other notions conflict with this teaching: the Spirit does not dwell in angels instead of believers, He does not leave with the church, and His presence is not negated in a tribulation context because the Spirit's ongoing work among the people of God rests on this permanent indwelling.

10. Who saves the Gentiles according to the material?

Grace is the means of Gentile salvation in this material. Salvation is presented as a gift from God received by faith in Jesus Christ, not something earned by keeping the Mosaic Law or by personal merit. This aligns with Paul's teaching that a person is justified by faith apart from works of the law (for example, Romans 3:28; Galatians 2:16). The law's purpose was to reveal sin and to point to Christ, not to save. Ephesians 2:8-9 emphasizes that it is by grace, through faith, and not by works, so no one can boast. Galatians 3:28 and other passages highlight that Gentiles are included in God's promise by faith, not by entering the Jewish ceremonial system. So the material's teaching is that Gentiles are saved by grace.
