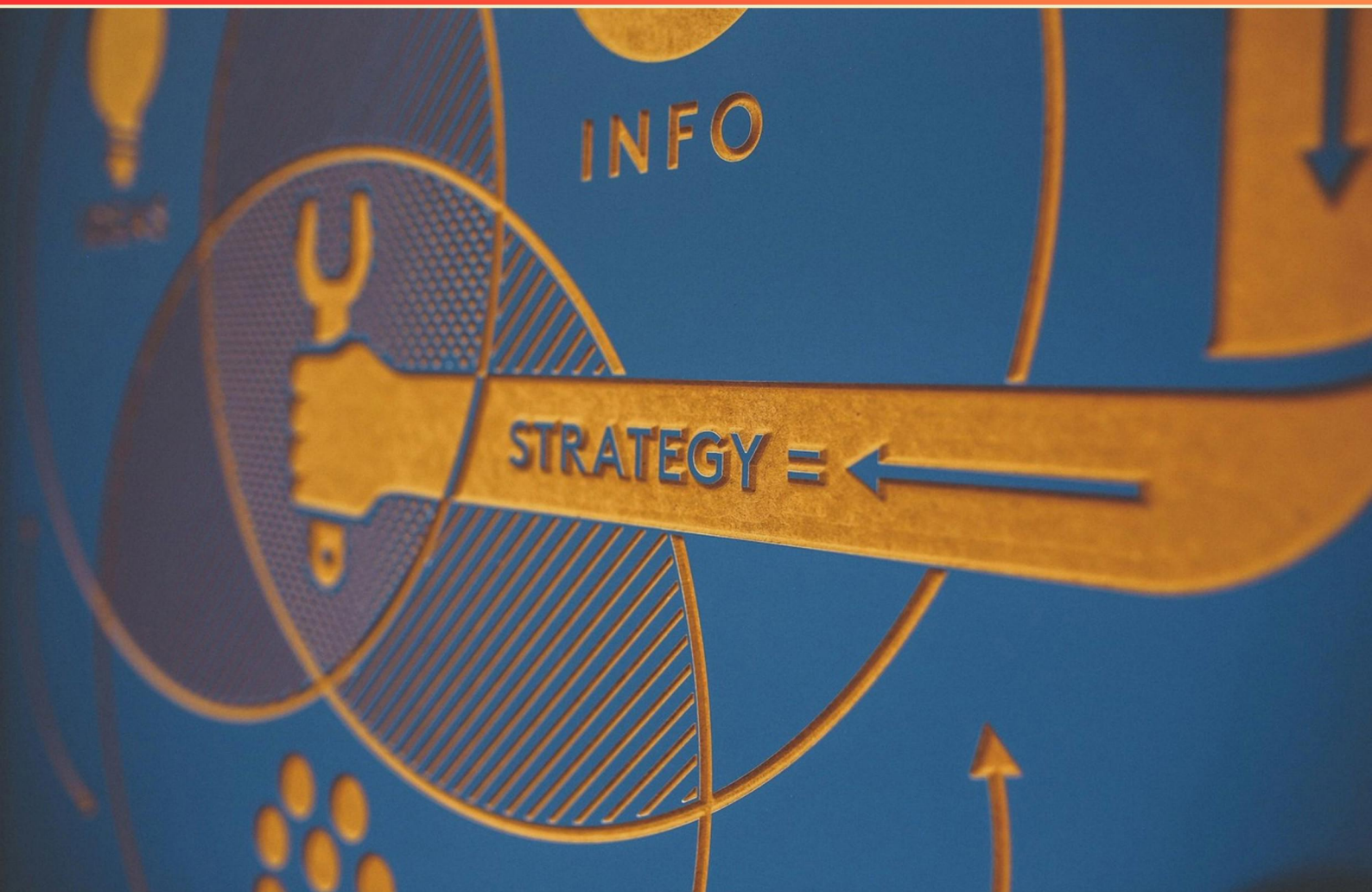

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## **Explanations**

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**1. The Tester lets you construct one or many clauses for a single test with a pass/fail or yes/no outcome.**

*The Tester is built to validate data against multiple conditions within a single test. It lets you add several clauses—each checking a different attribute, value, or property—and then it evaluates to a single pass/fail (yes/no) result for that test. This means you can assess multiple aspects in one check, for example ensuring an attribute equals a value and another condition about geometry holds, and the test as a whole reports true only if the combined criteria are met. You don't need any other tool to define these clauses—the Tester handles both the individual clauses and the overall outcome in one place.*

*Branding options in FME Server Apps let you customize the appearance, including the logo that appears in the user interface. You can replace the default FME logo with your own branding, or configure the app to display only your logo instead of the FME mark. This white-labeling capability is provided through the branding settings in the FME Server administration interface, allowing you to present a branded experience for your organization or clients. It's a built-in feature and does not require a premium license, so removing or replacing the FME logo is supported as part of standard branding customization.*

*List attributes in FME store multiple values under one attribute on a single feature, representing a collection. This matches object-oriented thinking, where an object can have a property that is a list of items, and it also maps to relational thinking, where a one-to-many relationship is represented by multiple related rows. By collecting related items into a list attribute, you can represent the object-side structure, and by expanding that list into separate records, you can recreate the relational side. So, using list attributes enables translating between object-oriented and relational data models, making this statement true. For example, a single feature with a list of phone numbers can be mapped to separate phone number rows in a related table.*

*Schema drift shows up as differences between what a schema is supposed to be and what it currently is. SchemaScanner addresses this by comparing the active schema in your workspace with a reference or target schema and surfacing where names, types, or structures differ. The typical workflow is to run that comparison and then pass the results into a reporting or remediation step that highlights the differences. Those results can guide you to update the reference schema or adjust the data accordingly (for example, adapt field types, rename fields, or re-structure data) so subsequent processing stays in sync. It's not about preventing drift upfront, invalidating submissions, or creating purely visualizations—the strength of SchemaScanner lies in producing a clear diff you can act on.*

*Join operations in FME hinge on join keys. A null or missing value on a join key cannot form a match, so in a strict inner join such features won't obtain joined attributes and may be dropped. But you can configure the Joiner to keep unmatched features (left, right, or full outer join behavior) or to pass through features that don't find a match, resulting in output where the joined attributes are empty for those features. Because of these options, features with null or missing join values are not always rejected—they can be preserved depending on the join type and settings.*

*Watching a folder for file activity is a task that hinges on a trigger designed to monitor file system changes. The trigger that fires when a directory's contents are updated—covering creation, modification, and deletion of files—is the one tied to a Resource or Network Directory in an updated state. This type of trigger is specifically built to detect changes in a directory, so it will start the workflow as soon as new files appear, existing files are modified, or files are removed. The other options respond to different kinds of events: system-related notices from the server, or incoming messages over UDP or JMS. They aren't designed to track changes inside a directory, so they wouldn't respond to files being created, modified, or deleted.*

*Run a Workspace Action is a way to execute another workspace from within a workflow and bring the results back into the current process. When you trigger the action, the referenced workspace runs and its outputs are returned to the calling workflow. Those outputs—such as transformed data, results artifacts, and status information—can then be used by downstream steps, enabling you to chain workspaces together. This behavior makes the description accurate: it runs a workspace and returns outputs. It's not limited to on-demand translations, it doesn't require a separate license just for the action, and it does produce outputs rather than none.*

**8. Which transformer would you use to combine multiple polygons separated by secondary soil types into fewer larger polygons grouped by their shared primary soil type?**

*Dissolving is about merging adjacent polygons that share a common value, removing the internal boundaries between them. When you set the dissolve attribute to the primary soil type, every polygon that has the same primary soil type will be merged with its neighbors, creating larger polygons that represent each primary soil type. The secondary soil types no longer force separate features because the boundaries are dissolved within those primary-type groups. The other options don't fit: Aggregator groups features and can summarize attributes but doesn't automatically merge the geometries into a single polygon per group; Clipper cuts polygons along boundaries; Bufferer adds a surrounding zone. So the Dissolver is the right choice.*

## 9. Which scenario is a typical use of a list attribute?

*A list attribute is meant to hold a collection of values under one attribute for a single feature, which is ideal when a feature is related to several items. Storing multiple Store IDs per feature captures a one-to-many relationship in one place, so you can represent all related stores without creating additional fields or features. The other options describe single-valued data—just one ID, a single digit, or a single date string—so they don't require or leverage a list. If you needed multiple dates or multiple IDs, a list would be appropriate, but the scenario given clearly aligns with storing multiple IDs.*

## 10. How many features fall in Flood Risk zone 1?

*Determining how many features fall inside a flood risk zone comes down to testing spatial containment and then counting the matches. You compare each feature's geometry to the polygon that represents Flood Risk zone 1, using a spatial relation such as within (for points) or intersects (for lines/areas) to identify which features lie in that zone. After identifying the matches, you tally them with a counter or a statistics tool to get the total. In this dataset, applying that spatial test to all features and counting the ones that meet the zone criteria yields 131 features inside Flood Risk zone 1. Keep in mind boundary handling (whether features on the edge count) can affect the exact total, and if the dataset contains multiple zones you'd first filter to zone 1.*
