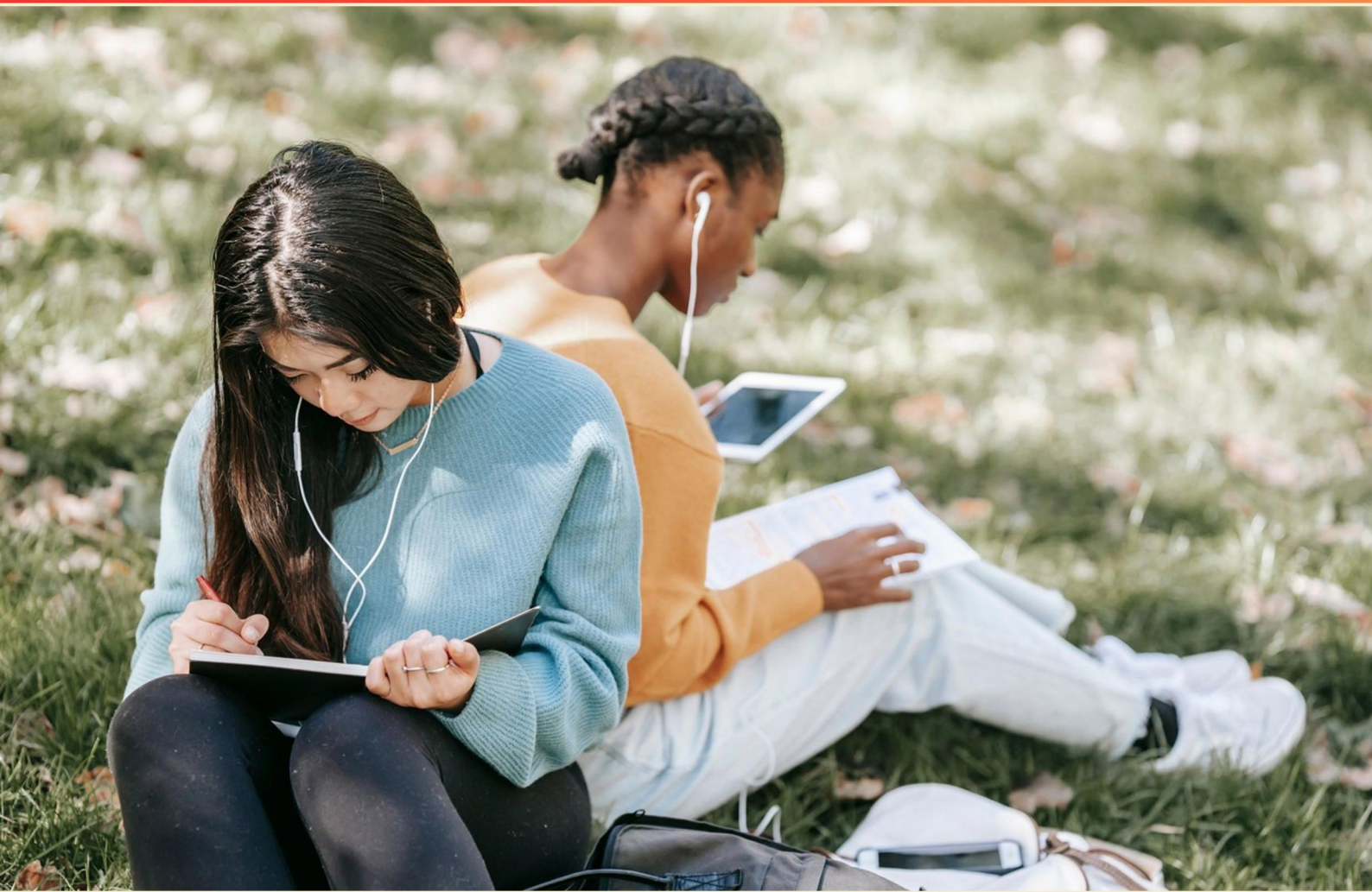

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## **Explanations**

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## 1. What is the term for the introduction of a bill in Congress?

This division promotes diversity in governance, allowing for different policies and approaches to local issues while maintaining national cohesion. In contrast, systems like a unitary system centralize authority in a single national government, and confederations typically consist of independent entities that delegate limited powers to a central authority. Authoritarian regimes do not usually feature a division of powers in the same way, as they centralize control in a single leader or ruling party.*

This high threshold prevents hasty or controversial changes from occurring without substantial consensus among states, reinforcing the stability of the Constitution. This requirement for ratification by three-fourths of the states illustrates the importance placed on broad agreement and reflects the historical context of the Constitution's framing, where the framers sought to create a system that would not easily be altered without significant deliberation and consensus.*

Wade tackled issues regarding reproductive rights, and McCulloch v. Maryland dealt with federalism and state versus federal power. Therefore, Engel v. Vitale is the definitive case that directly influenced the handling of religious practices within public schools.*

The other rights mentioned, while important, are not covered by the First Amendment. The right to bear arms relates to the Second Amendment, the right to a fair trial is typically associated with the Sixth Amendment, and the right to privacy, while recognized in various Supreme Court rulings, is not explicitly mentioned in the Constitution and is derived from a combination of amendments. Therefore, the correct choice, reflecting a direct protection enshrined in the First Amendment, is the freedom of speech.*

*The House of Representatives is granted the power to impeach the President.
