The Constitution is recognized as the supreme law of the land because it establishes the foundational legal framework and principles for the United States government and its relationship with the citizens. Thus, the Supreme Court remains the final arbiter of legal disputes in the country.

The 13th Amendment to the United States Constitution is the amendment that abolished slavery. This landmark decision reinforced the importance of protecting students from any government-imposed religious practices, thereby influencing educational policies and the interpretation of religious freedom in the context of public education. Other cases mentioned, while significant in their own right, focus on different aspects of civil rights and liberties. Brown v. Board of Education addresses racial segregation, Roe v. Wade pertains to women's rights and reproductive health, and Lemon v. Kurtzman deals with the financing of religious schools, which are important but do not specifically target the approach to religious practices in public education as

The ruling in McCulloch v. Maryland (1819) was fundamentally based on the Necessary and Proper Clause. This clause allows Congress to enact laws that are deemed necessary and proper for carrying out its enumerated powers. In the case, the Supreme Court held that Congress had the authority to establish a national bank, even though the Constitution did not explicitly grant this power. The Court reasoned that since creating a national bank was a means to an end—specifically, to effectively manage the nation's finances and execute the powers granted to Congress—it fell under the realm of what could be considered "necessary and proper." This interpretation reinforced the principle of implied powers, demonstrating that the federal government can take actions not explicitly outlined in the Constitution if those actions are related to its constitutional responsibilities. This decision also highlighted the balance of power between the federal and state governments, as the ruling established that states cannot impede valid constitutional exercises of power by the federal government. Thus, it underscored the strength and flexibility of federal authority in relation to state laws and actions, effectively setting a precedent for future cases involving implied powers and federal authority.

"No taxation without representation" pertains to the right to be represented in taxation matters, while "the right to bear arms" focuses on the regulation and ownership of weapons. Lastly, the statement regarding voting underscores the importance of suffrage but does not connect to bail or judicial treatment in the way that the principle in the English Bill of Rights does. This specificity makes the connection between the English Bill of Rights and the Eighth Amendment distinctly focused on the issue of bail rather than the broader themes of governance or individual

This landmark ruling effectively limited local government's power to discriminate against individuals based on race, promoting civil rights and ensuring that federal oversight upheld equality. District of Columbia v. Heller reinforced the Second Amendment rights of individuals to bear arms, ruling that laws restricting gun ownership could be seen as infringing on personal liberties. This decision again illustrated how local governments' regulations could be limited when they contravene individual constitutional rights. In combination, these cases represent significant instances where federal authority intervened to curtail local laws when those laws were found to infringe upon fundamental rights. This interplay between federal and local governance is crucial in understanding how the Supreme Court can act as a check on local decisions that may violate broader constitutional principles. The other options do not pair together in a way that similarly demonstrates the limitation of local government power through cases with this legal significance concerning individual rights. Thus, the choice is justified based on the impactful
