There are currently 94 federal district courts in the United States. The other options, 13, 50, and 100, are incorrect because they do not accurately reflect the number of federal district courts. Option B, 13, is likely referring to the number of US circuit courts of appeal, which is a different type of federal court. Option C, 50, may be confusing the number of states in the US with the number of federal district courts. And option D, 100, is likely mixing up the number of US Senators with the number of federal district courts.

Therefore, citizens are entitled to rights that are not specifically stated in the Constitution according to the 9th amendment.

This concept, rooted in social and political philosophy, illustrates that authority and power come from the consent of the governed, thus legitimizing the government's authority as long as it serves the welfare of the populace. The notion of a social contract emphasizes the importance of mutual agreement and the necessity of abiding by the rules set forth by the government resulting from this agreement. Such a framework fosters civic responsibility and a sense of community among citizens, underpinning democratic principles. The other choices address different aspects of political theory and civic engagement but do not encapsulate the essence of a social contract as effectively. For example, taxation linked with representation deals more with the rights of citizens within a government rather than the foundational concept of creating that government. The idea of rebellion against tyranny touches upon the limits of authority and the right of citizens to resist but is a consequence of breaking the social contract rather than what the contract itself entails. Finally, a literal written contract suggests a
