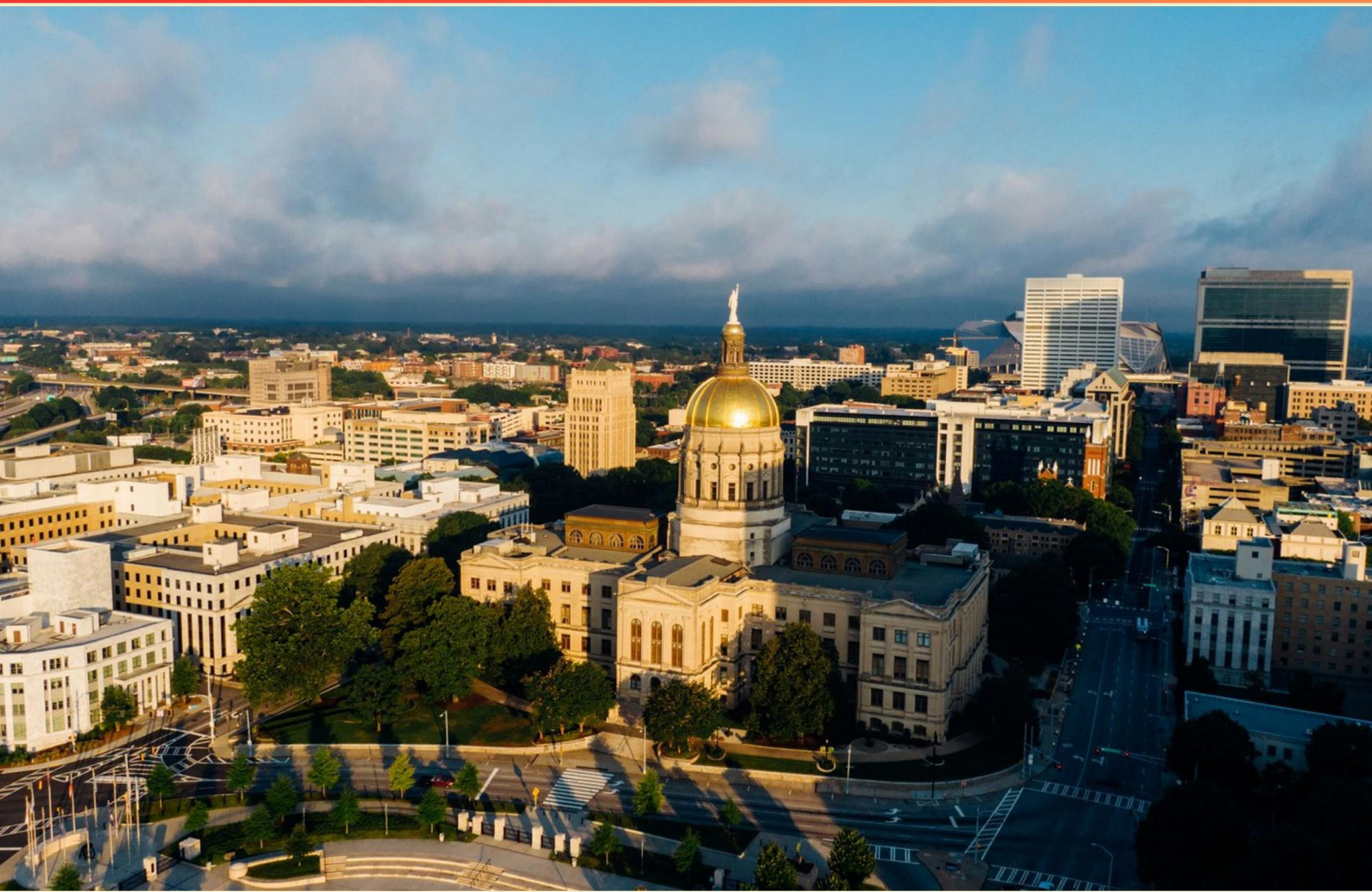

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Explanations

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1. What does terrorism target?

Terrorism is when a group or individual uses violence or fear to achieve a specific political, religious, or ideological goal. Targeting random civilians is a common tactic used by terrorists to spread fear and create chaos. 9. Which amendment guarantees the right to a speedy and public trial?

The right to a speedy and public trial is a protection aimed at keeping criminal prosecutions fair. This guarantee comes from the Sixth Amendment, which is designed to prevent delays that could prejudice the accused and to ensure the trial is open to the public so justice can be observed and checked. The Sixth Amendment also includes other important protections, like the right to an impartial jury, to be informed of the charges, to confront and cross-examine witnesses, to compel favorable witnesses, and to have legal counsel. The other amendments cover different areas: the Fifth Amendment focuses on due process and protections against self-incrimination, the Seventh covers jury trials in civil cases, and the Eighth protects against cruel and unusual punishment. So the amendment that guarantees the speedy and public trial is the Sixth Amendment.

Marbury v. Madison established the principle of judicial review, which is the power of the Supreme Court to declare laws and actions of the government unconstitutional. This decision strengthened the power of the Judicial Branch and set a precedent for future rulings. It did not address issues of segregation or the right to counsel in criminal trials, making options B and C incorrect. Option D also does not pertain to the decision in Marbury v. Madison as it was concerned with the legality of an executive order and not the desegregation of schools.
