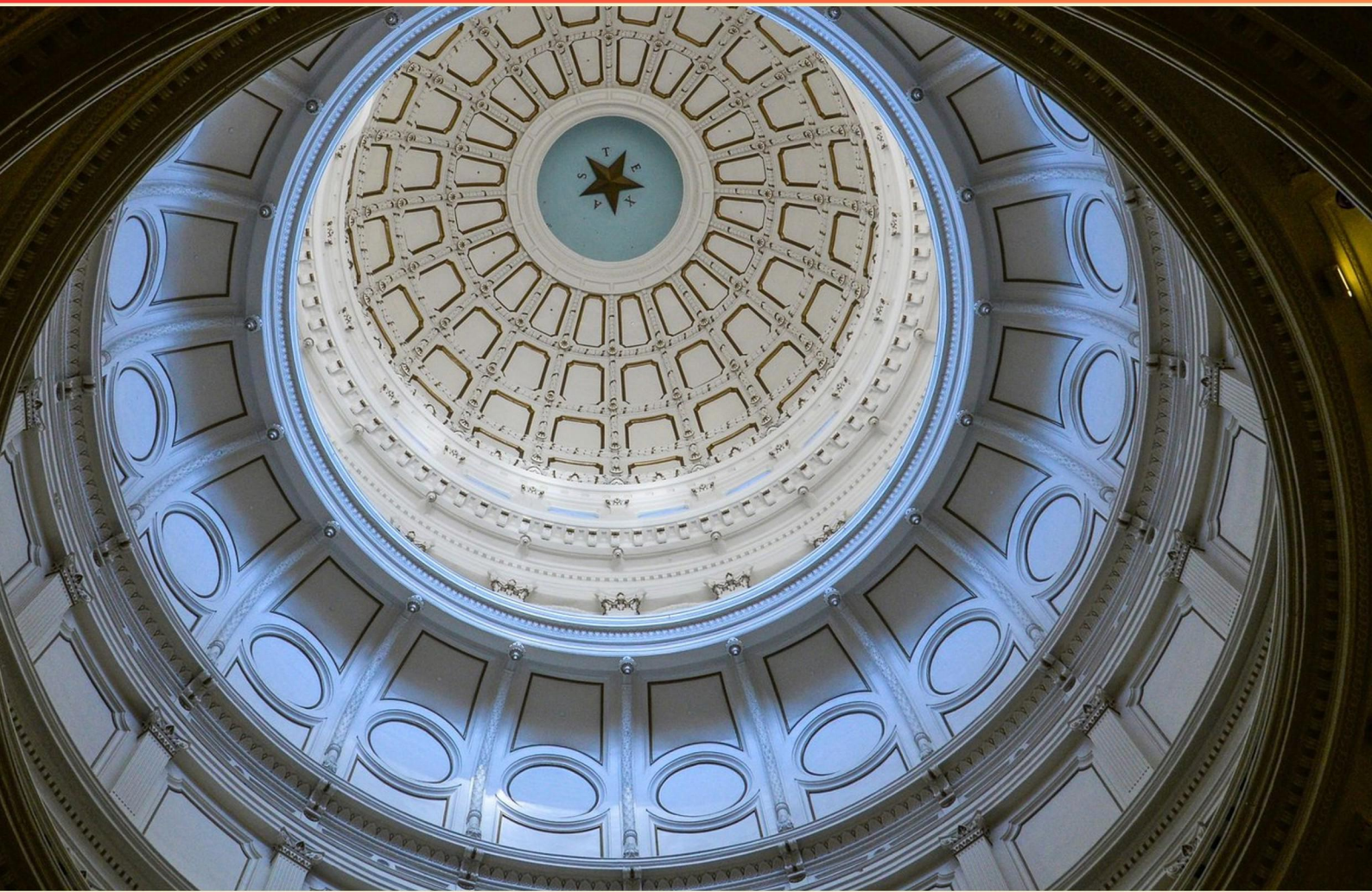

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Explanations

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1. How can you evaluate the impact of a public policy using data?

Evaluating the impact of a public policy with data means looking at measurable results the policy is supposed to affect and using evidence to judge whether those results changed in the intended direction. The best approach combines three elements: identify the outcomes the policy targets, compare data from before and after the policy's implementation to see what changed, and use credible sources and statistics to determine whether the observed changes are real and meaningful. This helps separate genuine effects from random fluctuation or bias, and it shows whether the policy achieved its goals. Relying only on anecdotes isn't reliable because stories aren't representative of the whole population. Ignoring data and relying on opinions isn't evidence-based. A solid evaluation uses outcomes, before/after data, credible sources, and statistics to assess effectiveness.

Evaluation is the stage where policymakers examine what happened after a policy was put into place. Before this stage, agenda setting is about identifying issues that should be addressed, formulation is about designing policy options, and adoption is the formal decision to authorize the policy. But the actual checking of results and impacts comes during evaluation.

Interest groups and lobbying aim to shape public policy by advocating for specific policies and communicating with those who make laws and regulations. They bring organized perspectives on issues to policymakers, share research and expert analysis, and mobilize supporters to influence how decisions are made. They use meetings, testimony, letters, and public outreach to persuade lawmakers and agency officials. They aren't there to replace elected representatives or to create laws directly; they work to influence policy decisions within the political process.

Local governments carry out state laws within their communities, putting statutes into everyday action through ordinances, enforcement, and local services while staying within the framework set by the state. States establish the laws and standards, and local governments implement them on the ground, adapting to local needs but not contradicting state law. For example, a state may set general rules that communities must follow, and local police, zoning boards, and schools apply and enforce those rules locally. This relationship isn't about international treaties or creating federal laws, which are handled by the national government, and national elections are organized under state and federal systems rather than by local governments acting alone.

Bias is a preference or attitude that favors one way of thinking or feeling over another. In civics, recognizing bias helps you see how information or arguments can be shaped to support a particular viewpoint, making it easier to evaluate what you read or hear objectively. This concept matters when analyzing news, speeches, or policy debates, because biased presentations can influence opinions even when the facts are the same. The other terms refer to things rather than a personal leaning: government is the system that makes and enforces laws; a candidate is a person running for office; communism is a political and economic ideology. None of those describe a personal preference toward one viewpoint over another, which is exactly what bias means.

Public opinion is the term for what the public thinks about a particular issue or set of issues at a given time. It represents the collection of attitudes and beliefs held by people in a society and can be measured through polls and surveys. Because it can change with events, news coverage, and personal experience, officials pay attention to public opinion to gauge support or opposition for policies and to guide how they communicate with citizens. The other terms describe different things: an issue is the matter itself, a watchdog is a group that monitors government, and propaganda is biased information used to influence opinions.

Federalism is the division of governmental authority between a national government and regional governments, so both levels have powers they can exercise. In practice, the national government handles areas like defense and foreign policy, while states manage local matters such as schools and policing, with some powers shared or overlapping. This structure prevents either level from having all the power and allows different policies to fit local needs while maintaining national unity. The other descriptions don't fit because they either leave out the national level, place too much power in one central authority, or focus only on local governments without a national framework.

Negotiation between nations is diplomacy. Diplomacy is the practice of managing international relations through dialogue, negotiation, and negotiation of agreements such as treaties or peaceful settlements, typically carried out by official representatives like diplomats. It aims to resolve conflicts and advance a country's interests without resorting to force. NATO is a military alliance focused on security commitments, not the process of negotiating between governments. The United Nations provides a forum and framework for international cooperation, supporting diplomatic efforts, but the act of negotiating itself is diplomacy. Commerce is about trade and economic exchanges between countries, not the negotiation process.

This authority rests with the states, not with the President, the Supreme Court, or the Department of Education. In this framework, the chosen option—two-thirds of the states—is the correct description of who can trigger a national convention. Any amendments proposed would still need ratification by three-fourths of the states.

After a veto, the only way to override it is for both chambers of Congress to pass the bill again with a two-thirds vote. This high threshold means broad, cross-party support is needed, not just a simple majority in one part of Congress. When both chambers achieve two-thirds approval, the bill becomes law despite the president's objections. If either chamber falls short of that two-thirds margin, the veto stands.
