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Explanations

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1. The outdoor exercise requirement may be affected by which factor?

Outdoor exercise is provided only when conditions are safe. Weather directly affects safety and practicality, so if conditions are unfavorable—such as rain, lightning, extreme heat or cold, or other hazardous weather—the outdoor time is canceled or postponed. Inmates' mood isn't a factor in this decision, and while staffing or security concerns can influence operations, the factor that most directly determines whether outdoor exercise can occur is the weather. That's why weather permitting is the best answer.

2. Which inmates are explicitly eligible for custody in reduced custody housing area beyond misdemeanants and non-dangerous felons?

It's not designed for high-risk inmates, nor for long-term housing of all inmates, and it isn't intended for medical isolation. The idea is to hold low-risk individuals in a safe, controlled space so custody can be downgraded or custody status reassessed without tying up higher-security housing.
