Consulting with peers can be beneficial, but it should complement a nurse's understanding of established legal and ethical frameworks rather than serve as the sole basis for practice. Thus, adhering to both legal standards and ethical guidelines is essential for nurses to ensure they provide care that is both lawful and morally sound.
