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## **Explanations**

Understanding the structure of the NDC is vital for pharmacy technicians, as it aids in correctly identifying medications and their corresponding details.*

Herbal supplements and vitamins or minerals also do not typically require prescriptions since they are considered dietary supplements and are not classified the same way as controlled substances. The requirement for a prescription for controlled substances reflects the need for professional oversight in their use, ensuring they are prescribed only when medically necessary and used safely.*
