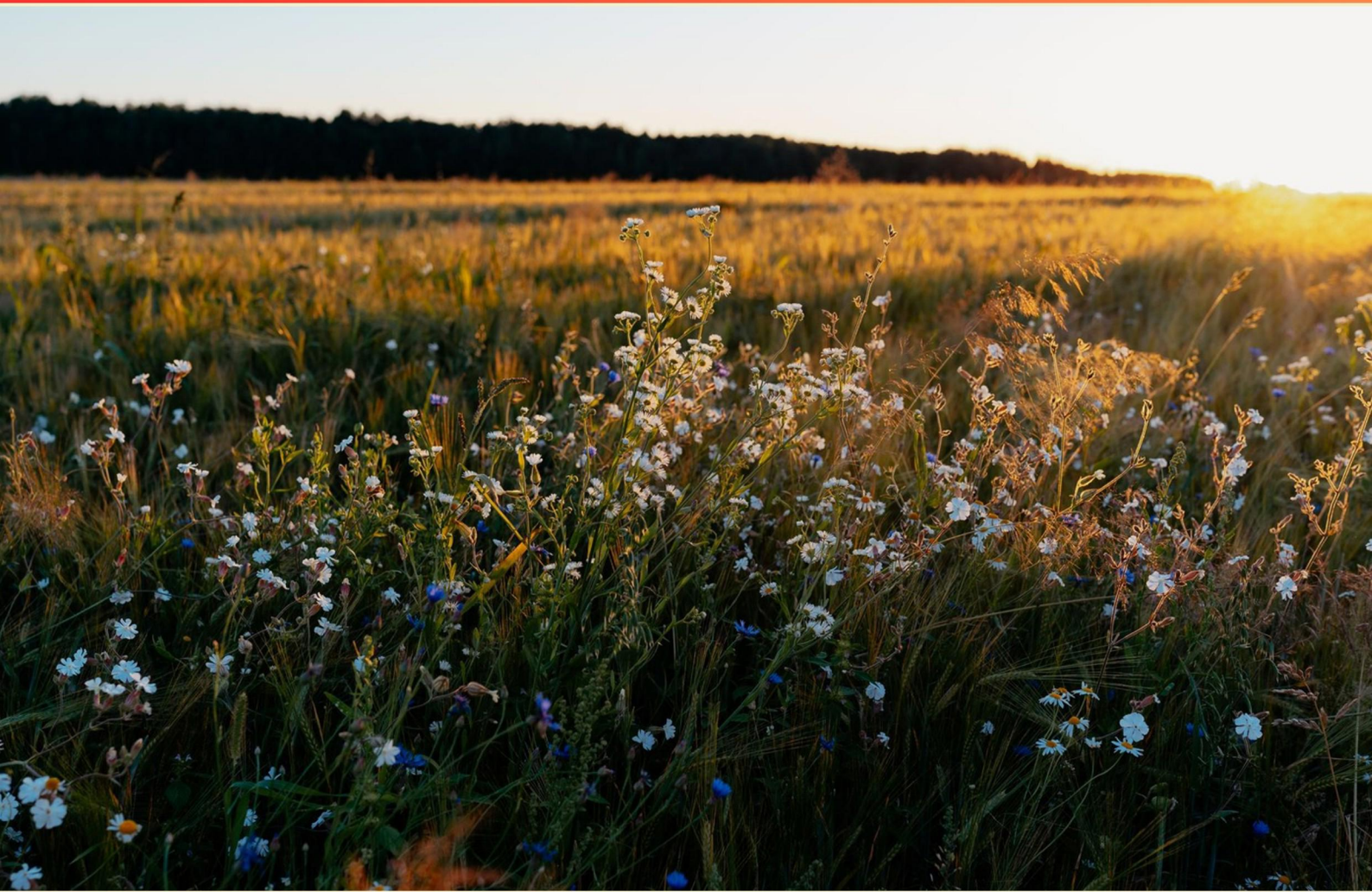

1. Which is not an aldehyde?

- A. Menthol
- B. Acetaldehyde
- C. Benzaldehyde

Aldehydes are characterized by a carbonyl group bonded to a hydrogen, the formyl group -CHO. Acetaldehyde, benzaldehyde, and formaldehyde all contain this -CHO unit in their structures, so they are aldehydes. Menthol, in contrast, has an alcohol functional group (-OH) and a hydrocarbon framework rather than the -CHO group, so it is not an aldehyde.

2. The structure that consists of a filament and anther forms which reproductive organ?

- A. Pistil
- B. Stamen
- C. Carpel
- D. Stigma

The structure described by a filament with anther is the stamen, the male reproductive part of a flower. The filament is the slender stalk that holds up the anther, where pollen is produced and released for fertilization. In contrast, the pistil (female part) includes the stigma, style, and ovary, and the stigma is the sticky tip that captures pollen, not the filament-and-anther combination. So the filament-plus-anther description matches the stamen.

The material groups ornamental plants by how they're used or displayed: cut-flowers for floral stems and arrangements, bedding plants for seasonal garden displays, and container-grown landscape plants for pots and small-space landscapes. Foliage plants, while a common category in horticulture, are grown mainly for leaf texture and color rather than flowers or use in beds and containers, and they aren't listed among the categories in that material. So foliage plants don't fit the set described there, whereas cut-flowers, bedding plants, and container-grown landscape plants do.

Stargazer lilies exemplify how a new cultivar is moved from the breeding program to the marketplace: once a hybrid proves its desirable traits and is stabilized for consistent performance, it's released as a finished product that growers can propagate and sell under a specific name. That means it arrives to farmers and florists as a complete, market-ready variety rather than a work-in-progress line. This fits because Stargazer was introduced as a named, commercial cultivar after evaluation and refinement, not as a wild selection awaiting further development. It didn't rely on genetic modification, since traditional hybridization produced it, and while it's prized as a striking cut flower, lilies like Stargazer are also grown in gardens, so the "primarily used for cut flowers only" notion isn't accurate.

The carpel is the female reproductive unit of a flower, the part that bears ovules. The term pistil refers to the whole female structure of the flower, which is made up of one or more carpels and includes the stigma, style, and ovary. So, in basic terms, a single carpel can form a simple pistil, and in many flowers the pistil is composed of multiple carpels. That's why pistil is the correct name for the carpel in general usage. The other options point to different flower parts: stamen is the male part, filament is part of the stamen, and petal is a floral leaf that attracts pollinators.

Spring display and Easter symbolism are the main ideas here. Easter lilies are commonly sold as potted plants in spring and are closely tied to Easter traditions, often described as Bunny Day in materials that link the flower to the holiday. This alignment with both the season and the celebration is why that statement is the best fit. The other options don't match typical practice: lilies aren't limited to outdoor growth only, they're indeed related to spring festivals, and they're frequently grown or forced in greenhouses to meet Easter displays.

Fioli sits in the San Francisco Bay Area, in Woodside, California. It's a historic estate whose formal gardens are open to visitors, which makes it natural to describe it as a botanical garden in the Bay Area. The emphasis here is on its location and garden character, rather than any museum or private hall role. The historic aspect is real, but for locating and understanding what you'd experience there, this choice best captures its public garden identity in the region.

Cut roses are grown in a controlled environment to ensure consistent quality and year round production. A greenhouse gives growers precise control over temperature, humidity, light, and ventilation, which helps produce strong stems, large blooms, and longer vase life. It also supports careful irrigation and fertilization and reduces exposure to rain, wind, and pests that can damage blooms or cause diseases like Botrytis. The other environments can't provide the same level of climate control and protection, making it harder to achieve uniform, high-quality cut roses.

9. In Flower Confidential, which topic does Amy Stewart NOT discuss?

Flower Confidential looks at the real-world practices and people behind the cut-flower industry. It explains how cultivation methods—greenhouse environments, soil and fertilizer choices, pest control, and labor conditions—shape what gets grown and how it's produced. It then follows the path from farm to market, showing how global sourcing, transportation, and seasonal demand influence production decisions and what ends up in vases around the world. The book also covers how breeders pursue new varieties, including genetic modification, to meet preferences and improve durability. What it does not do is present economics of flowers as a formal economic analysis—price theory, market-wide profitability, or macro-level economic structure. Instead, the emphasis stays on practical realities, the supply chain, and the human stories behind the trade, with market trends discussed in terms of observed changes in demand and production rather than abstract economic modeling.

Patenting a plant centers on giving breeders a temporary, exclusive right to propagate and sell a new and distinct plant that is reproduced asexually. The Plant Patent Act of 1930 created this protection specifically for asexually propagated plants, like clones produced by cuttings or grafting. That's why patenting is a primary way breeders can secure financial reward for a new variety, and why this act is described as covering only asexually propagated plants. Other statements misstate the reality: patent rights do not make a plant free for anyone to use, because patents restrict what others can propagate or sell. The idea that patenting has no relation to hybrid breeding or financial rewards isn't accurate, since breeders pursue patent protection precisely to monetize their new plant developments. And the notion that patent protection applies equally to sexually and asexually propagated plants isn't correct; plant patents cover asexually reproduced plants, while sexually reproduced varieties may be protected under other laws (like plant variety protection) rather than plant patents.
