Other options like a plea agreement, dismissal order, or felony complaint do not serve this specific function in the Grand Jury process. A plea agreement is typically negotiated after charges have been brought, whereas a dismissal order ends legal proceedings. A felony complaint is a document that initiates a criminal case but does not involve the Grand Jury's decision-making process. Thus, the appearance of a true bill indictment before a trial is crucial to ensure that the legal framework for a felony case is established correctly.
