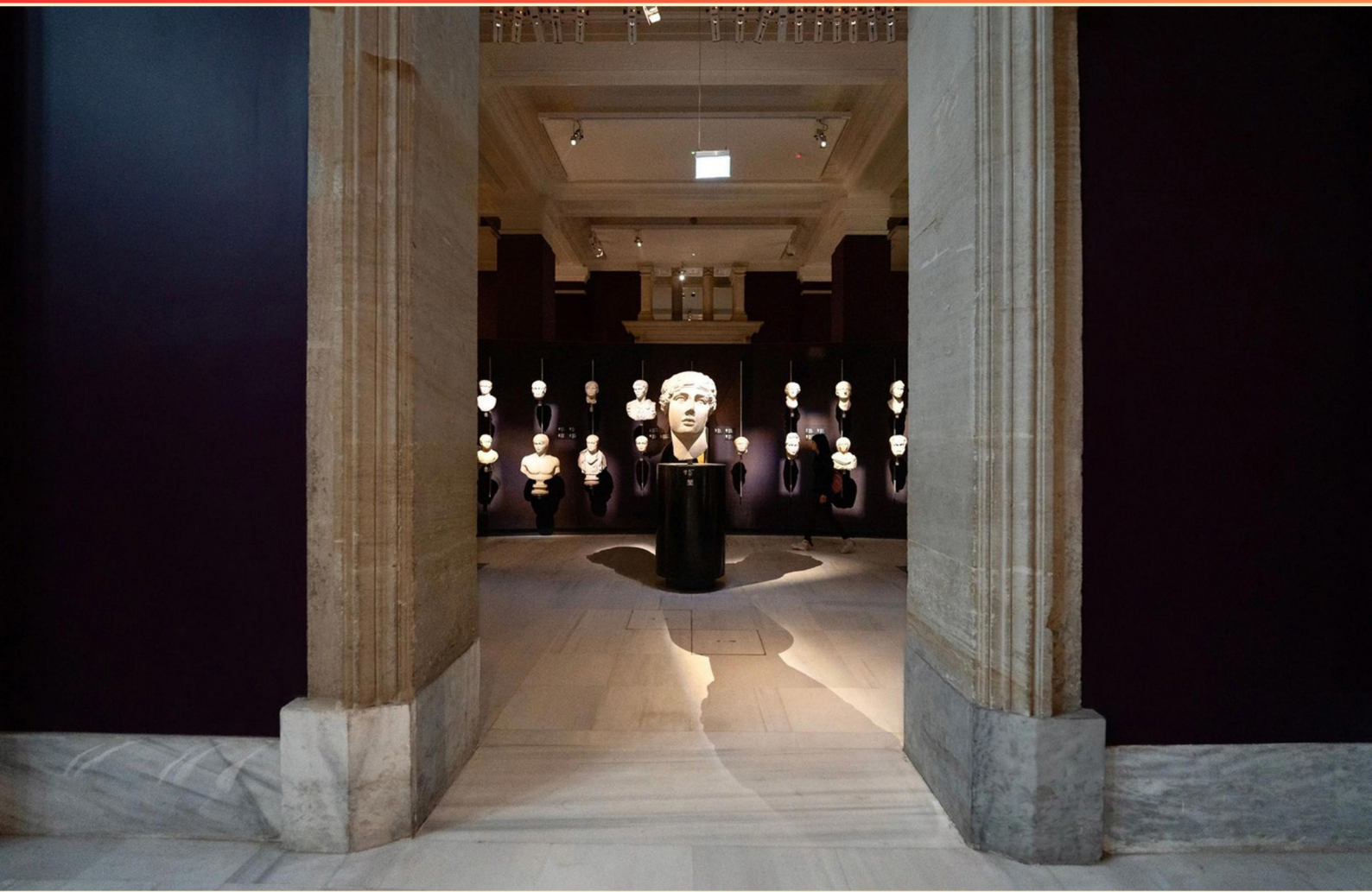

Other printing techniques mentioned have different processes: relief printing involves raised areas of a surface, screen printing uses a mesh screen to transfer ink, and offset printing relies on transferring ink from a plate to a rubber blanket to paper, none of which feature incised lines as the primary method of creating an image.
