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Explanations

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1. What does the term e-iatrogenesis describe in health information technology?

e-iatrogenesis describes harm that arises from health information technology. This idea recognizes that tools meant to help clinicians—electronic health records, computerized order entry, decision support, and data exchange systems—can inadvertently cause harm if they are poorly designed, misused, or misaligned with real clinical workflows. Examples include incorrect data being auto-populated, alert fatigue leading to ignored critical warnings, or interface complexity causing user errors. The concept focuses on negative outcomes created by the technology itself or its implementation, not on improvements like smoother data flow, nicer interfaces, or data compression.

Other options don't target the safety-critical design and deployment of prompts and alerts: color schemes mainly affect readability and usability, while printer compatibility and hardware warranty terms relate to hardware logistics rather than safety metrics for prompts and alerts.

This focus on applying genomic data to patient care distinguishes it from broader infrastructure topics or general safety and governance issues. Information management/operational architecture deals with data systems and workflows, consultation involves expert informatics guidance, and safety, security, and environmental health centers on protecting data and system safety rather than the genomic content itself.

The best statement captures this by stating that informatics practitioners apply their knowledge and skills to be transformational leaders and resources for clients in formal and informal ways, across internal and external boundaries. This reflects the advisory, collaborative, and change oriented role of a consultant who helps stakeholders understand options, tailor solutions, and drive improvements in care delivery and decision-making. Choosing a view that limits the role to technical programming misses the core idea of consultation, which is about guidance and leadership rather than pure development tasks. Likewise, reducing the area to data entry and record keeping frames it as routine data management rather than strategic, client facing support. Emphasizing hardware procurement and vendor management shifts the focus to IT operations and purchasing, not the advisory partnership central to consultation.

This ongoing approach ensures nurses and other staff can use new interfaces, understand updated decision support, protect patient data, and apply data-driven practices in real time. It isn't optional for staff, it isn't limited to hardware changes, and it doesn't stay the same forever—the training and educational tools must evolve as technology and practice evolve.

INS professionals use their clinical experience, data, and knowledge of how information systems and workflows affect patient outcomes to inform policymakers about what works in practice, where barriers exist, and what governance or standards are needed. When advocacy and policy development are aligned, policies reflect real care delivery needs—privacy, interoperability, patient safety, and effective care coordination across settings—leading to better outcomes. The idea that advocacy is separate from or unrelated to policy misses how policy is shaped by informed voices from practice, and focusing only on consumer health overlooks the broader professional input that drives meaningful policy change. So, advocacy supports policy through expertise and care coordination.

The key idea is governance of how data is handled over its lifecycle. Writing and enforcing record retention policies sits squarely in Compliance and Integrity Management because this area focuses on ensuring policies meet legal and regulatory requirements, governing data use, and maintaining data integrity through monitoring and enforcement. Enforcing retention policies requires oversight, audits, and accountability to make sure the organization actually adheres to the rules and preserves records properly. While policy development involves creating policies, the active enforcement and alignment with laws and organizational standards point to Compliance and Integrity Management. Education and Training would be about teaching policies, and Data Analysis would focus on analyzing data rather than governing its retention and compliance.

Data Flow Diagrams show how data moves and is transformed in a system. Data stores may also be included to indicate where data is kept. Patient satisfaction scores, while they can be data items that the system handles or produces, are not a structural element of the diagram itself. They represent a type of data content or an output metric, not a defined component like a source/destination, a flow, or a process. Hence, patient satisfaction scores do not belong as a DFD component.

In nursing informatics, the analyst's work centers on data—making sure it's accurate, consistent, and usable, and turning it into actionable insights. Maintaining data integrity and reliability means establishing quality controls, validating data, and cleaning errors so reports and analyses reflect the truth of what happened. Facilitating data aggregation and analysis involves pulling data from multiple sources, linking datasets, and running analyses to reveal patterns, trends, and performance. Identifying outcomes is about defining the right measures, tracking them over time, and presenting them in a way that shows whether interventions or processes are improving care. Improving patient satisfaction, while a vital goal of care quality efforts, is not a primary analytic function. An analyst provides the data and analyses that inform satisfaction initiatives, but driving those improvements is typically led by quality improvement or patient-experience teams and involves changes to processes, communication, and service design.
