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Explanations

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1. Which intramuscular site is least appropriate for administration of a 3 mL dose?

- A. Deltoid**
- B. Dorsogluteal
- C. Ventrogluteal
- D. Vastus Lateralis

Understanding where and how much can be injected into muscle is about matching the dose to the size and safety of the muscle. The deltoid muscle in the upper arm is relatively small, so it has a limited capacity to hold intramuscular injections. For most adults, the deltoid is best for small volumes—about 1 mL. A 3 mL dose would overfill this site, increasing pain, tissue irritation, and the chance that the medication ends up deposited in subcutaneous tissue rather than truly in muscle, with unreliable absorption. Other sites with thicker, well-developed muscle—like the ventrogluteal area and the vastus lateralis—can safely accommodate a 3 mL dose and provide better absorption. The dorsogluteal site, while able to hold larger volumes, is avoided in many practices because of the risk to the sciatic nerve and less reliable landmarks. Thus, the deltoid is the least appropriate choice for a 3 mL IM dose.

When communicating with patients who have cognitive impairment, using simple language, short sentences, repetition, visual aids, and teach-back is most effective. This approach reduces cognitive load, making information easier to process and remember. Short, plain phrases help prevent confusion, and repeating key points reinforces understanding. Visual aids support memory and comprehension when words alone aren't enough. Teach-back, where the patient demonstrates what they've understood, allows you to confirm accuracy, correct misunderstandings, and adapt the explanation as needed. Complex medical jargon confuses memory and understanding. Relying only on written materials assumes good reading skills and intact memory, which may be lacking. Skipping education to reduce stress deprives the patient of essential information needed to participate in care and stay safe. The combination of plain language, concise delivery, repetition, visuals, and teach-back directly supports comprehension and safe, effective care.

Pacing the knowledge portion lets the patient process, reflect, and cope with the news before moving on to details or decisions. Sharing information in small, manageable chunks with pauses invites questions, clarifications, and emotional responses, which helps ensure understanding and memory. It also lets you observe nonverbal cues, adjust the level of detail, and maintain support and rapport throughout the conversation. This approach respects the patient's pace and coping style, reducing overwhelm and helping preserve a sense of control. Rushing to deliver all information at once can lead to confusion, misinterpretation, and heightened distress, which undermines trust and informed decision-making.

Reflective communication centers on confirming that what one person intends to convey matches what the other person understands. Asking clarifying questions is the best activity for this because it invites the speaker to elaborate and the listener to verify meaning, creating a shared understanding of the issue. It demonstrates active listening, helps uncover any misinterpretations, and aligns both parties on the concerns and next steps. Providing immediate solutions can short-circuit exploration and trust, jumping to conclusions relies on assumptions about what was meant, and ignoring nonverbal cues misses important signals that affect meaning.

Paraphrasing is restating the patient's message in your own words to confirm you've understood them. This technique focuses on the content of what they're saying and invites them to correct any misinterpretation, which helps ensure accurate communication and safety. For example, if a patient says they're worried about managing their medications at home, you might respond, "So you're worried about taking your meds at home and remembering the schedule?" This shows you're listening and clarifying meaning. Reflecting would emphasize the feelings behind the words; clarifying involves asking questions to remove ambiguity; and summarizing provides a brief review of several points at the end. Paraphrasing is the best fit for confirming understanding of the message itself.

Paraphrasing is the technique shown when you restate what the patient said in similar words. It demonstrates that you heard and understood the message, and it helps verify accuracy without adding new meaning. By rephrasing, you invite the patient to confirm or correct your interpretation, which keeps the dialogue accurate and collaborative. For example, if the patient says they're overwhelmed by their workload and unsure they can handle the shifts, you might respond, "You're feeling overwhelmed by your workload and unsure you can handle the shifts." This shows you captured the essence of their concern and encourages them to expand or clarify. This differs from reflecting, which centers on expressing the emotional content behind the words; focusing, which narrows the discussion to a specific topic; and validating, which acknowledges the patient's feelings as understandable. Paraphrasing specifically mirrors the content of the message in slightly different wording to ensure understanding.

When a patient is confused and keeps asking the same questions, the goal is to calm the situation and help them understand what's happening without overwhelming them. Reassure them in a gentle, steady voice, use simple, short language, and avoid medical jargon. If a question is repeated, repeat the explanation in clear terms and then check their understanding by using teach-back—ask the patient to summarize in their own words what you've explained. This confirms what they've grasped and reveals any remaining gaps, so you can address them right away. This approach also supports safety and comfort. Speaking slowly, orienting the patient to time and place, and offering brief, one-idea-at-a-time information helps reduce cognitive load and anxiety. Teach-back not only shows you what they understand but reinforces their memory, which is often impaired in confusion or delirium. Choosing to ignore questions, use technical language, or rush through explanations tends to increase anxiety and confusion and misses opportunities to ensure the patient really understands. Delaying explanations can leave the patient uncertain and unsafe.

Parenteral administration means giving a drug by routes that bypass the digestive system, typically via injection or other non-oral methods. Intravenous fits this definition because the medication is delivered directly into the bloodstream through a vein, producing rapid and controllable effects without going through the gastrointestinal tract. Buccal and sublingual are mucous-membrane routes in the mouth; they bypass the stomach but are not injections and are not usually labeled parenteral. Oral involves swallowing and goes through the GI tract, so it is not parenteral.

9. Which statement best describes the evaluation step in the nursing process?

Evaluation is the step where you judge how well the patient's outcomes have been achieved by comparing the actual results with what was expected in the plan. This comparison shows whether the interventions worked, if goals were met, partially met, or not met, and it guides necessary changes to the care plan. For example, if the goal is to reduce pain to a certain level and the patient's pain remains higher, you would adjust the analgesia plan and reassess. Evaluation is not about diagnosing new problems (that happens earlier in assessment/diagnosis), nor is it solely about planning for the next shift (planning occurs before or alongside implementation), and it isn't limited to assessing comfort alone—evaluation looks at all defined outcomes, including safety, functional status, and physiological measures.

Effective communication with patients who have limited English proficiency hinges on using a professional interpreter and confirming understanding. A professional interpreter or interpreter services ensure accurate translation of medical information, preserve patient confidentiality, and help obtain informed consent while accurately conveying instructions about medications, procedures, and care plans. Verifying understanding, such as using teach-back, ensures the patient truly grasps what has been discussed and can follow through safely. Relying on family members to interpret can introduce errors, bias, omissions, and privacy concerns, which can compromise safety and trust. Machine translation apps are unreliable for the nuances of medical terminology and consent. Speaking quickly or using medical jargon further impedes comprehension. Using plain language, speaking at a clear pace, and pausing for questions while engaging a professional interpreter provides the safest, most respectful approach to care.
