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## **Explanations**

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### 1. Which term means fast tempo with spirit?

- A. Amabile
- B. Andante
- C. Allegretto
- D. Allegro con spirito**

Tempo markings tell you how fast to play and how to shape the feel. The phrase that means fast tempo with spirit combines speed and energy: *Allegro con spirito*. *Allegro* signals a brisk, lively pace, and *con spirito* adds a spirited, energetic character, so together they request a quick, bold, and lively performance. Looking at the others helps clarify why this fits best. *Amabile* describes a sweet, gentle character rather than a tempo, so it doesn't specify speed. *Andante* indicates a walking pace—slower and more relaxed. *Allegretto* is moderately fast, faster than *Andante* but not as brisk or as energized as *Allegro con spirito*, which includes the extra directive of spirited delivery. So the term that captures both a fast tempo and a spirited, energetic feel is *Allegro con spirito*.

### 2. Which form is defined by a three-part structure where the first and last sections are the same?

Ternary form, often noted as ABA, is built on a three-part plan where the opening material returns after a contrasting middle section. You hear the initial A, then a distinct B, and finally the same or very similar A again, which gives the piece a sense of balance and closure. This specific structure is what sets it apart from other forms: strophic repeats the same music across verses without a formal three-part layout; binary form has two sections (A followed by B) without the required return of A; through-composed moves forward with new music rather than repeating large sections. So the defining idea is the return of the opening material after the contrasting middle, making ABA the correct description.

*Marcato* signals a strong emphasis and a marked attack on the note. In singing, this means you bite into the note with a clear, deliberate onset, making it sound bolder and more accented than surrounding notes. It's a direction for texture and shape, not just duration or rhythm. *Meter* deals with the pattern of beats in measures and doesn't specify how to attack a note. *Lunga* indicates a longer held duration, focusing on length. *Niente* means fade to nothing, guiding dynamics toward silence. So *marcato* is the term that specifically calls for a pronounced, emphatic attack.

*Tempo primo indicates returning to the original tempo that was set at the start of the piece or section. For example, if the piece began at Andante, after a delay or rubato, tempo primo tells you to go back to Andante.*

*Text painting is the technique of making music illustrate the meaning of the lyrics. In vocal music, composers shape melody, rhythm, dynamics, and articulation to reflect what the words express. For example, rising text can be set with an ascending melodic line, long syllables can be held on longer notes, and an exclamatory phrase may feature a sudden dynamic or rhythmic burst. Descending words might be mirrored with a falling contour or a soft diminuendo. This approach helps listeners "hear" the text as they listen, linking poetry and music in a vivid way. Other notations like tempo markings, caesura, or breath marks serve different purposes (speed, pauses, or breathing) and don't inherently depict the meaning of the words.*

#### 6. Which term means solemn, with dignity?

*In music, terms that describe mood and tempo come from Italian. The marking that means solemn and dignified is grave. It indicates a very slow tempo with a serious, weighty character, inviting a weighty, restrained approach. Grazioso signals graceful, elegant phrasing—lighter and more playful than solemn. A half-step is simply a chromatic minor second interval, not a mood or tempo marking. Harmonic minor refers to a scale form with a raised seventh degree, used for tonal color, not mood. So grave is the term that best conveys solemnity and dignity.*

## 7. What is the primary effect of messa di voce in performance?

*The main idea here is how volume is shaped on a single sustained note. In messa di voce, the singer starts softly, gradually grows louder to a peak, then returns to softness—all on the same pitch or syllable. This creates a dynamic swell that adds expressiveness to the line. It hinges on breath support and careful control of vocal fold tension so the volume can rise and fall without changing the pitch. It's not about changing tempo, pitch, or rhythm, which is why those options don't fit. Used well, the pitch remains steady while the loudness shifts, giving a colored, expressive emphasis to the sustained note.*

## 8. Which term describes an improvised or written-out ornamental passage for a soloist near the final cadence?

*A cadenza is a virtuosic solo passage for a performer near the end of a movement, often allowing either improvised flourish or a prewritten display by the composer. It sits right before the final cadence, giving the soloist a moment to show technical skill and expressive control before the orchestra settles the music with the concluding chords. An arpeggio, by contrast, is simply a broken-chord figure—playing the notes of a chord in sequence—without the specific role of a dramatic, cadential spotlight. A caesura is a deliberate sudden pause or break in the music, not a solo display. Cantabile describes a singing, lyrical style of playing, not a distinct structural device for a solo at the cadence.*

## 9. Which term describes a gentle, lyrical mood?

*Amabile conveys a gentle, lyrical mood and direction for how to sing the line. It comes from Italian and suggests a warm, singing quality—soft dynamics, smooth legato, and a tender, melodic feel. In contrast, allegro con spirito means a fast, energetic tempo with spirit, which is the opposite of gentle. Allargando indicates broadening the texture and often slowing a bit to give a spacious feel, not necessarily gentle in character. A tempo simply returns to the original pace after a deviation. So, when you want a piece to feel singing and sweet, with a gentle, lyrical character, amabile is the appropriate marking.*

**10. Which term means gradually dying away, softer and slower?**

*The idea being tested is how a performer fades the sound to an ending—making the music soften and slow down gradually. Perdendosi instructs just that: gradually dying away, with the volume decreasing and the tempo slowing so the line seems to fade into silence. This creates a whispered, expressive conclusion to a phrase. Portamento is a smooth glide from one pitch to another, focused on pitch connection rather than changing dynamics. Presto is a directive for a very fast tempo, not a fade. Phrase refers to the musical unit or sentence formed by notes, not a performance gesture about volume or speed.*
