The warm temperatures at the Equator support vibrant ecosystems, such as tropical rainforests, which are rich in biodiversity. Additionally, the increased heat leads to greater evaporation rates and can create distinct weather patterns, including regular precipitation and seasonal variations characteristic of tropical climates. This consistent warmth and humidity fundamentally shape the ecosystems and weather conditions in equatorial regions and their surroundings.*

The stratosphere lies above the troposphere and contains the ozone layer, which absorbs and scatters ultraviolet solar radiation. The mesosphere is situated above the stratosphere and is known for its decreasing temperatures with height, as well as being where most meteors burn up upon entering the Earth's atmosphere. Each layer has distinct characteristics and functions, making the thermosphere the correct answer for describing the outermost layer.
