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1. Whose ideas are considered foundational to modern democracy?

John Locke's ideas are foundational to modern democracy primarily because of his concepts of natural rights, social contract, and government by consent. Locke argued that individuals are born with certain inalienable rights, including life, liberty, and property. He posited that the primary role of government is to protect these rights, and if a government fails to do so, the people have the right to overthrow it. Locke's emphasis on reason and individual rights significantly influenced Enlightenment thought and laid the groundwork for democratic principles that emphasize the importance of individual freedoms and the belief that government derives its authority from the consent of the governed. His writings greatly impacted the founding documents of modern democratic states, especially the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution of the United States. In contrast, although other thinkers like Jean-Jacques Rousseau and Thomas Hobbes contributed to political philosophy, their visions of the social contract and governance differed from Locke's views on natural rights and individual liberty, thus making Locke's ideas more directly influential in shaping modern democratic thought. St. Thomas Aquinas, while notable for integrating reason with faith, did not advocate for the kind of democratic principles that emerged in the Enlightenment.

The other choices involve strategies that would limit trade rather than facilitate it, which fundamentally contrasts with the principles of trade liberalization. For example, increasing tariffs would raise costs for imported goods, establishing trade quotas would restrict the amount of particular goods that can be traded, and promoting isolationist policies would seek to minimize trade altogether.

While features like being built on high ground or defensibility might have played roles in settlement decisions, the river's direct impact on transportation and commerce was particularly significant in establishing Savannah as a key settlement. The agricultural aspects would develop later, but initially, the river's role was paramount.

Therefore, rather than accepting aid or collaborating with Western nations, the Soviets sought to strengthen their own ideological base through Cominform, maintaining solidarity among communist states and opposing Western capitalist policies. This move was part of a broader strategy to create a buffer zone and ensure that the Eastern European countries remained under Soviet influence, contrasting sharply with the economic and political cooperation promoted by the Marshall Plan.

The New Deal aimed to provide relief for the unemployed, recovery of the economy, and reform of the financial system to prevent future economic crises. Thus, the significance of Franklin D. Roosevelt's policies as the architect of the New Deal is central to understanding the government's response to the Great Depression and its lasting impact on American society.

The Trade Route can refer generally to any road used for trading purposes, the Spice Route specifically focuses on the trade in spices primarily from Asia to Europe, and the Amber Road was a trade route that connected the Baltic region with the Mediterranean, mainly used for trading amber. Thus, the Silk Road stands out as the most historically significant and encompassing network linking these vast regions.

Additionally, Gettysburg set the stage for future Union victories and is often cited as a pivotal moment leading to the eventual defeat of the Confederacy.

Galileo Galilei is credited with inventing and significantly improving the early telescope, and he was the first to use it for astronomical purposes. Prior to Galileo, the concept of the heliocentric model was proposed by Copernicus, but it lacked the observational support that Galileo's findings provided. Newton contributed to the understanding of gravity and the laws of motion but did not invent the telescope or initially advance the heliocentric theory. Kepler built on the work of both Galileo and Copernicus with his laws of planetary motion, yet he had no role in the invention or first use of the telescope. Hence, Galileo's unique contributions through his use of the telescope played a vital role in popularizing and confirming the heliocentric theory in the scientific community of his time.

These texts contain the laws (mitzvot) and teachings that form the basis of Jewish belief, practice, and identity. The Torah is revered not only for its religious commands but also for its narratives that recount the history of the Jewish people, their covenant with God, and the moral and ethical frameworks that guide their lives. It is traditionally read aloud in synagogues and is central to Jewish worship and study, making it foundational to Judaism as a whole. The significance of the Torah is underscored by its role in Jewish festivals and daily life, such as during the celebration of Simchat Torah, marking the completion and restart of its annual cycle of readings. In contrast, the other texts mentioned—Zoroastrian Avesta, Quran, and Bhagavad Gita—are sacred in other religions: Zoroastrianism, Islam, and Hinduism, respectively, and they hold different beliefs, practices, and historical contexts
