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Explanations

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1. Which continent contains the most countries?

- A. Africa
- B. Asia
- C. Europe
- D. South America

When we count how many countries a continent contains, we're looking at sovereign states that are generally recognized as independent nations. Africa has 54 recognized sovereign nations, more than any other continent. This large number comes from a history of many African territories gaining independence in the 20th century and becoming separate political states. In comparison, Asia has about 49 recognized countries, Europe around 44, and the Americas are smaller in total, with roughly 12 in South America and about 23 in North America. Keep in mind that some lists count dependent territories differently, but the standard tally used in geography and by the United Nations places Africa at the top.

2. The Barbary Coast lies along which sea?

- A. Atlantic Ocean

The Barbary Coast is the stretch of North Africa along the western and central Mediterranean, facing the Mediterranean Sea. This coastline runs from roughly Morocco through Algeria and Tunisia to Libya, hugging the sea that connects Europe, Asia, and Africa. The Mediterranean Sea is the correct sea because that region borders it directly; the Atlantic Ocean lies farther west beyond the Strait of Gibraltar, the Indian Ocean is far to the southeast and off the African coast, and the Black Sea sits to the northeast near Turkey and eastern Europe.

3. Which country is the most populous in the world?

- A. United States
- B. India
- C. Indonesia
- D. China

The main idea this question tests is population size—the number of people living in a country. China has long held the top spot in global population, with about 1.4 billion people, which makes it larger in people than the United States and Indonesia. India has grown rapidly and, in recent years, has been very close to China in population; depending on the year and data source, it can be larger or just behind. This context helps you see why, among the given options, China is the most populous, illustrating how population rankings can change over time even as the general idea—counting people—stays the same.

4. Which country, with the capital Bishkek, lies between China and Kazakhstan?

- A. Uzbekistan
- B. Tajikistan
- C. Kazakhstan
- D. Kyrgyzstan**

Think about where Kyrgyzstan sits in Central Asia. The country whose capital is Bishkek is Kyrgyzstan. It is bordered by Kazakhstan to the north and China to the east, so Kyrgyzstan lies between China and Kazakhstan on the map. The other options aren't between those two: Uzbekistan is to the west of Kyrgyzstan, Tajikistan is to the south, and Kazakhstan is to the north.

5. East Timor's independence came from which country?

- A. Portugal
- B. Australia
- C. Malaysia
- D. Indonesia**

East Timor's independence followed the end of Indonesian rule. Indonesia invaded and occupied East Timor in 1975 and controlled it for about 24 years. The turning point came in 1999, when a United Nations-supervised referendum showed the Timorese choosing independence from Indonesia. After international intervention, Indonesia withdrew and East Timor became a sovereign nation in 2002. While East Timor was formerly a Portuguese colony, the modern path to independence came through ending Indonesian occupation, not through Portugal. Australia and Malaysia did not grant independence.

6. Which language is NOT an official language of Switzerland?

- A. German
- B. French
- C. Italian
- D. Spanish**

Switzerland recognizes four national languages: German, French, Italian, and Romansh. These languages have official status at the federal level and appear in government work, education, and public services in different regions. German dominates central and eastern Switzerland, French in the west, Italian in the south, and Romansh in parts of Graubünden. Spanish is widely spoken by some residents and visitors but is not an official language of the country, so it does not have the formal role in government or public life.

7. During the Gulf War, the coalition liberated which nation from invasion?

- A. Iraq
- B. Qatar
- C. United Arab Emirates
- D. Kuwait**

Kuwait is the nation that was invaded by Iraq in 1990 and then liberated by a broad international coalition during the Gulf War. After Iraq's invasion, the United Nations authorized military action, and a coalition led by the United States launched Operation Desert Storm. In February 1991, coalition ground forces moved into Kuwait and expelled Iraqi troops, restoring Kuwaiti sovereignty. The other places listed were not invaded and liberated in that conflict (Iraq was the aggressor, while Qatar and the United Arab Emirates were members of the coalition). The key idea is recognizing the specific country that faced invasion and was freed through international military action in that war.

8. Which African country was settled by freed slaves?

- A. Eritrea
- B. Liberia**
- C. Gabon
- D. Ghana

A country in Africa that was founded as a homeland for freed enslaved people from the Americas is Liberia. In the early 1800s, the American Colonization Society helped settle freed slaves and free Black people from the United States and the Caribbean along the coast, and these communities grew into Liberia, with Monrovia as the capital. Liberia then declared independence in 1847, becoming Africa's first republic established by freed slaves. The other places listed have different colonial histories: Eritrea developed under Italian and later Ethiopian rule, Gabon was a French colony, and Ghana (the Gold Coast) was a British colony—none were created specifically as settlements for freed slaves.

9. Which of the following is a country on the Prime Meridian located in North Africa?

- A. Morocco
- B. Tunisia
- C. Egypt
- D. Algeria**

The Prime Meridian is the zero degree longitude line that runs from the North Pole to the South Pole and serves as the reference for measuring east and west. It passes through Greenwich and then across parts of Europe into North Africa, where it intersects Algeria. That intersection is why Algeria is the country on the Prime Meridian among the options. The other countries lie to the west or east of that 0° line, so they aren't crossed by it.

10. The United States mined Baker and Howland Islands for which natural resource?

A. Phosphate

B. Oil

C. Guano

D. Coal

Guano—bird droppings rich in phosphate—was a highly valued fertilizer in the 19th century. Islands with large seabird colonies, like Baker and Howland, accumulated thick guano deposits, making them attractive to harvest. The United States even passed the Guano Islands Act in 1856, allowing claims on uninhabited islands with guano deposits, which led to mining on these atolls. The actual extraction focused on the guano deposits themselves, supplying phosphate for fertilizer. Oil and coal aren't associated with these islands, and while phosphate is a component of guano, the resource mined was the guano itself.
