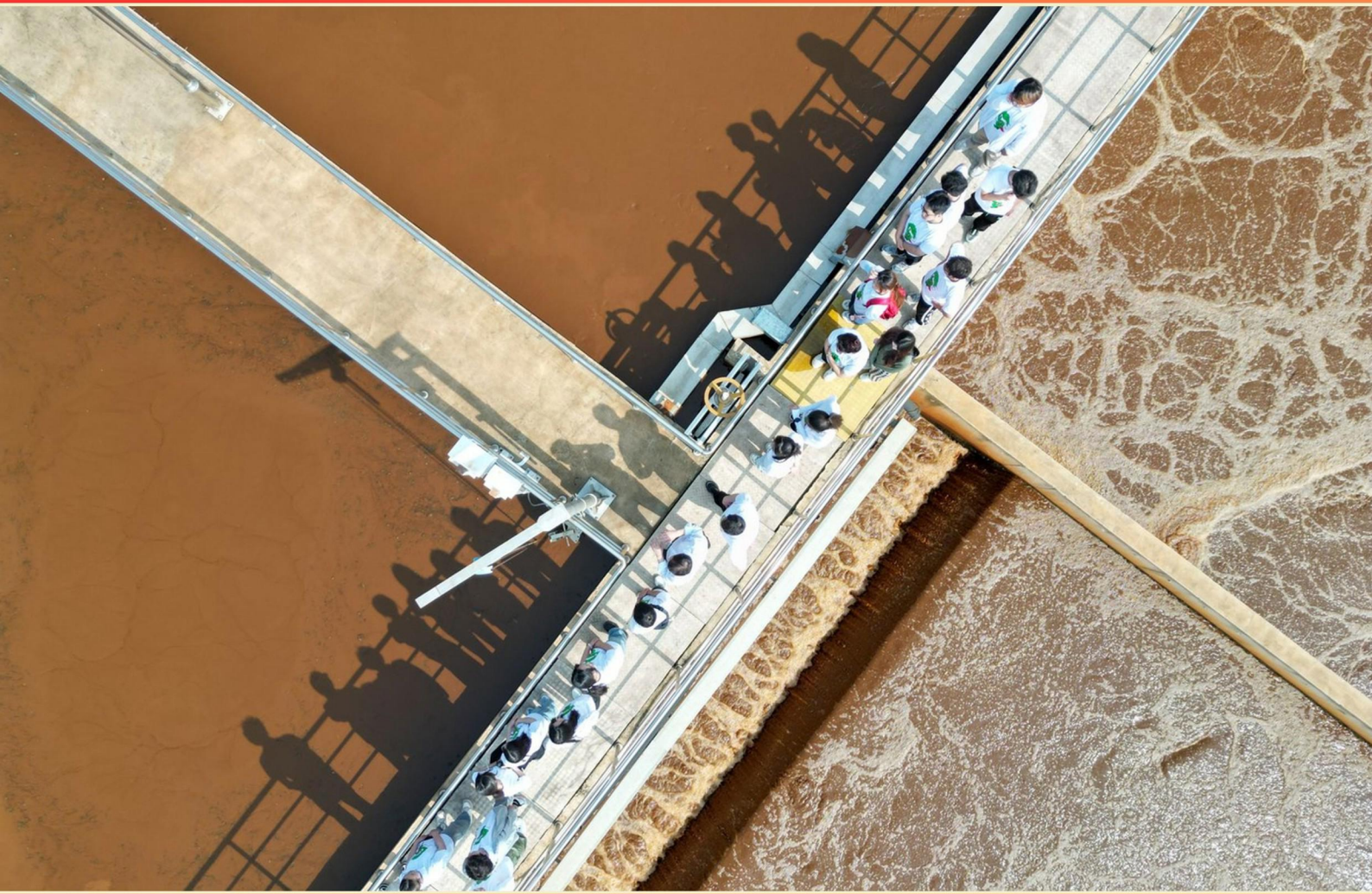

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Explanations

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1. Which insects undergo complete metamorphosis?

A. Bees, Wasps, Hornets, Ants

B. Grasshoppers

C. Flies and Mosquitoes

Complete metamorphosis means four life stages: egg, larva, pupa, and adult. Insects that go through this process transform dramatically—the larval form looks very different from the adult and often has a different lifestyle. Bees, wasps, hornets, and ants are classic examples. They hatch as worm-like larvae, become pupae where major transformation happens, and then emerge as adults that usually have wings and distinct bodies from the larvae. Grasshoppers and bed bugs don't follow that four-stage path. They develop through a series of molts from nymphs that resemble small adults, but they never enter a pupal stage. Flies and mosquitoes do experience complete metamorphosis as well, with larval and pupal stages, but the group referenced is still a clear instance of complete metamorphosis in this context.

2. Cockroaches and Praying Mantis belong to which order?

The groupings are based on distinct physical traits and life cycles that define each order. Cockroaches belong to Blattodea, a category that circles around flat-bodied insects with broad pronota and chewing mouthparts; modern classifications even include termites in Blattodea, so this order covers these roaches and their close relatives. Praying mantises, on the other hand, are in Mantodea, an order noted for their elongated bodies, triangular heads, and especially their grasping, spiny forelegs used to catch prey. Because these two groups are placed in different orders, there isn't a single order that includes both cockroaches and praying mantises. (If you've seen termites listed separately as Isoptera in older tables, note that current taxonomy moves termites into Blattodea, not Mantodea.)

Poultry ectoparasites that feed by remaining fixed on the bird's skin are marked by their rigid attachment while they feed. The sticktight flea does exactly that: it clings to the bird's skin—often around the eyes, beak, wattles, or comb—and sucks blood. That persistent attachment is what gives it away as a poultry-specific problem, causing irritation, scabbing, and sometimes anemia in heavy infestations. Bedbugs target humans and aren't adapted to stay on birds, and the crab louse and head louse are human parasites that infest people, not poultry. So the parasite that attacks poultry by sticking to the skin is the sticktight flea.

4. Cerambycid moisture requirements are described as which of the following?

Cerambycids need wood with a higher moisture level for their larvae to develop inside the wood. The moisture in the wood helps keep tissues supple and supports the fungi and enzymes that help break down the wood so the larvae can feed and grow. If the wood is too dry, conditions become unfavorable for larval survival; if it's extremely wet, other problems can arise, but cerambycid development still centers on a comparatively wetter environment than dry wood. So, describing their moisture requirements as high—not dry or only lightly moist, and not extreme saturation—best matches what these beetles need to complete their life cycle.

5. Which pest is very destructive and has been subject to federal quarantine in the past?

Khapra beetle stands out because it is one of the most destructive pests of stored grains, with larvae that bore into seeds and contaminate huge quantities of flour, cereals, and processed products. A single infestation can grow rapidly, and eggs or tiny larvae can hide inside grains or packaging, making early detection very hard. Because infestations can spread easily through imported shipments and containers and cause massive economic damage, federal authorities have used quarantine measures to prevent its movement and introduction. While other stored-product pests can also cause damage, Khapra beetle has a history of triggering such federal quarantine actions due to its extraordinary potential to devastate stored foods.

6. Which order includes silverfish, bristletails, firebrats?

These insects are primitive wingless ones that were traditionally grouped together in one order because they share similar body plans and lack of wings. Silverfish, bristletails, and firebrats all fit that flightless, carrot-shaped body type with tail-like appendages, which is why they were placed in Thysanura. In modern taxonomy, bristletails are placed in Archaeognatha and silverfish plus firebrats in Zygentoma, but many study sources still use the older grouping. The name Thysanura itself points to those tail fringes, helping remember this association.

7. Which ectoparasite has sticky eggs which attach to the host?

Lice eggs are glued to the host's hair shaft with a sticky cement the female secretes, so the eggs (nits) stay firmly attached close to the scalp. This adhesive attachment is a defining feature of lice as ectoparasites, helping their offspring stay with the host and increasing the chance of successful development. Because of this, you'll often see white or yellowish nit shells clinging to hair near the scalp, rather than loose eggs on the skin or in the environment. The other options don't attach eggs to the host: bat bugs lay eggs in cracks and crevices of the environment, grain mites live in stored grain products, and springtails are tiny soil-dwelling creatures not parasitic on humans. Therefore, head and body lice are the ones with eggs that stick to the host.

In Georgia, commissions that operate under the Department of Agriculture are appointed by the Commissioner of Agriculture. This gives the department head direct control over who serves on these commissions, helping ensure that their membership aligns with agricultural policy goals and program needs. Appointees typically bring practical experience from farming, industry, or public service, and their terms are set by state law or department rules. While governors commonly appoint members to many boards, this specific commission's appointment authority rests with the Commissioner of Agriculture to keep governance closely connected to the department's mission.

9. Within the provided pairings, which order is associated with Arachnida?

A. Centipede order

B. Book louse order

Arachnida includes spiders, scorpions, ticks, and mites. Of the options, mites are the only group that fits as an arachnid; centipedes and millipedes are myriapods, and book lice are insects. So the pairing that aligns with Arachnida is the mite order.

10. Which arthropod is an insect ectoparasite described as the larva of the common harvest mite, with 3 pairs of legs in the bloodmeal stage and 4 pairs as an adult?

A. Chigger

B. Blood-sucking conenose

Chiggers show how mites differ from typical insects in their life stages. In mites, the larval form has three pairs of legs, and after molts the later stages have four pairs of legs. The larvae of the common harvest mite are parasitic on hosts, including humans, and this 3-legged larva becoming an 8-legged (four-paired) adult pattern is a hallmark of mites rather than insects. They attach to the skin and inject enzymes that break down tissue, which causes itching rather than feeding on blood. Among the options, the organism described by a larval stage with three legs and an adult with four legs, and described as an ectoparasite derived from the harvest mite, is the chigger.
