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Explanations

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1. What term refers to the configuration involving multiple cameras feeding live video to a switcher in a studio?

A. Three Camera

B. RGB Color Space

C. Chrominance

In studio production, a switcher takes live feeds from multiple cameras and lets you switch between them in real time. When three cameras feed into that switcher, creating multiple angles for the producer to choose from, you're looking at a three-camera setup. This configuration provides essential coverage: a wide shot to establish the scene, a closer angle for expressions, and a third angle for variety or reactions, all enabling smooth, dynamic transitions during the live program. The other options relate to color information or electrical power, not to how camera feeds are arranged for live switching.

2. Content whose primary goal is to attract clicks; title drives views.

The main idea here is recognizing content that is designed to maximize views by using a provocative or sensational headline to lure people in. This tactic is known as clickbait. The key is that the title is crafted to drive clicks, often by creating curiosity or an emotional reaction, sometimes with promises that the content may not fully deliver. That focus on the headline as the hook is what makes it clickbait. Exclusive refers to information or access that isn't available elsewhere, which isn't inherently about attracting clicks through a catchy title. Copy is just generic written material or text, not a specific strategy to boost views with a punchy headline. Fake news denotes misinformation or deceptive reporting, which is about truthfulness and reliability rather than the specific mechanism of using a catchy title to pull in clicks. While some fake news might use clickbait tactics, the term that best fits a content approach aimed at drawing views via the title is clickbait.

In page design, the display element that immediately grabs attention by stretching across the full width and using the largest type is a banner. This top-wide, oversized headline is meant to dominate the page and signal the main story. The masthead is the publication's nameplate and branding at the very top, not the bold top headline. The deck is a secondary headline that adds detail about the story, but it's smaller than the main banner. The lead is the opening paragraph of the article, not a headline. So the description matches a banner headline, making it the best fit.

4. What term describes initial coverage of events that can happen at any moment?

The idea being tested is reporting that happens the moment events unfold—time-sensitive, developing coverage. The term for that is breaking news. It describes reporting on events as they happen, with rapid updates as new details come in. This kind of coverage prioritizes immediacy, often featuring live reports, alerts, and continual updates until the situation stabilizes or enough facts are confirmed. Why this fits best: breaking news is specifically about events that can happen at any moment and require quick, fresh information, rather than polished, finalized stories. The other options don't fit the concept as well: copy is general written material used in various contexts and not inherently tied to immediacy; an exclusive is a story published first by one outlet and isn't about timing; a commentator is a person who provides analysis or opinion, not the initial factual coverage of an event.

5. What device is a monitor with lines written on it for the talent to read from?

A teleprompter is the device that displays the script on a monitor in front of the talent so they can read their lines while looking directly at the camera. The text scrolls at a speed that's easy to follow, and a reflective glass or beamsplitter lets the audience see the talent's eyes while the words appear in their line of sight. This setup is different from a slate, which is used to sync audio and video at the start of a take; ENG refers to a field-style news gathering method rather than a reading aid; and a character generator creates on-screen graphics, not a reading device. So the monitor with lines for reading is the teleprompter.

6. Which producer is the individual who provides financial backing for a production and influences creative decisions alongside the director and department heads?

The main idea here is identifying who funds a production and also has a say in big creative choices alongside the director and department heads. The executive producer fits this role because they secure the financing—whether from studios, investors, or production companies—and they typically have high-level input on major creative decisions. They help shape the project's direction and ensure resources align with the vision and goals of those funding it, working alongside the director and heads of departments. In contrast, a line producer handles the day-to-day production logistics, budgeting during filming, and keeping the schedule on track, rather than providing the initial funding or shaping the overall creative direction. A producer (in general) might be involved in development, financing, and hiring, but the term "executive producer" specifically denotes the person who provides the financial backing and has influence over the creative direction at a strategic level. The director, of course, focuses on the artistic vision and execution, not on financing.

7. What plan lists the cast, equipment, locations, budget, and schedule for production?

The main idea here is using a document that anchors all production logistics around the story. A completed script serves as the central reference because it defines who appears in each scene (the cast), where each scene occurs (the locations described in the scenes), and what needs to be filmed to tell the story (the action and dialogue). From that script, you determine the gear and crew required for each scene, estimate the budget based on locations, props, and effects, and build a shooting schedule that fits the sequence of scenes. In short, the final script provides the backbone from which you derive equipment needs, locations, budget, and timing. The other options are more specialized and don't capture the full planning role. A treatment outlines the story concept, not the logistical plan. A call sheet is a daily schedule for cast and crew on set. A shooting script adds technical directions but still focuses on how to shoot, not the overall production plan.

8. Which practice yields natural framing on an interview set?

Placing the camera at the subject's eye level yields a natural, relatable view in an interview. When the camera matches where the person is looking and speaking from, the viewer feels a sense of equality and connection, as if they're in a real conversation. This height also helps keep facial features and expressions rendered with familiar proportions, and it supports comfortable headroom and framing so the subject appears engaged without looking exaggerated or distant. Shooting from a low angle can convey authority or dominance, which changes the viewer's perception of the subject, while placing the camera behind the subject breaks eye contact and creates distance. A telephoto lens changes perspective and can compress the background, altering the sense of immediacy and intimacy—so it isn't inherently natural framing for an interview.

9. In TV lighting, why do performers wear makeup?

Under bright studio lights, the face tends to cast strong shadows and show every contour. Makeup helps even out the skin tone and reduce those shadows so the face reads clearly on camera. Foundation and powder minimize uneven color and shine, creating a flatter, more uniform surface that studio lights can illuminate evenly. While makeup can contribute to a polished look, the primary purpose in TV lighting is to prevent shadows and flatten the face so facial features stay visible and consistent on screen. The other options describe glamour or color tweaks, but they're not the main reason makeup is used in this context.

10. Which term describes only a thin band on the Z axis being rendered in sharp focus?

A. Shallow Depth of Field

B. Deep Depth of Field

C. F-stop

D. Aperture

Shallow depth of field describes a shot where only a thin plane along the depth (the Z axis) is in sharp focus. Everything in front of and behind that plane becomes blurred, creating that pronounced sharp subject with a soft background or foreground. This happens most when the lens is set to a wide aperture (low f-stop), which reduces the range of distances that appear sharp. A deep depth of field would keep a large range of distances in focus, not the isolated plane described here. While f-stop and aperture influence depth of field, they're about the camera settings that create the effect, not the effect itself.
