Inhalants, although they can have sedative effects, do not act as rapidly in the brain as heroin does. Therefore, heroin stands out as the correct answer for a drug that quickly slows thought processes and memory due to its fast absorption and potent effects on brain function.

In contrast, the other options imply positive effects that are not supported by research. Binge drinking does not improve coordination or reflexes; in fact, it has the opposite effect. It also does not enhance social interactions or cognitive functions, as excessive alcohol consumption can lead to miscommunication and memory impairment.
