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Explanations

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1. Which artist is known as an Impressionist who painted ballet, horses, and bathers?

- A. Monet
- B. Degas**
- C. Renoir

Impressionism aims to capture movement and moments from everyday life, often focusing on how light and action feel in a scene. Edgar Degas stands out for taking that idea into the world of motion, especially with ballet dancers in motion, which he portrayed from unusual viewpoints and with cropped compositions that give a sense of immediacy. He also painted horses in racing scenes and bathers, reinforcing the themes of everyday public life and human form in dynamic moments. While Monet and Renoir are also associated with Impressionism, their famous subjects lean more toward landscapes and social scenes, respectively, whereas Degas' signature mix of ballet, horses, and bathers aligns with the movement's interest in captured movement and contemporary life. Picasso, in contrast, belongs to later movements like Cubism.

In color theory, value is how light or dark a color is. When you mix a hue with white, you raise its lightness while keeping the color family the same. That lighter version is called a tint. Tints are the pastel, airy versions of the original color, like red plus white making pink or blue plus white making baby blue. A tone, by contrast, comes from adding gray, which dulls the color and lowers saturation. A shade is created by adding black, making the color darker. The hue itself is simply the color name (red, blue, etc.) without changing its lightness.

3. Which technique demonstrates foreshortening, making parts appear shorter than they are?

Foreshortening is the drawing technique used to convey depth by shortening parts of an object that point toward or away from the viewer. When a limb or another element is oriented toward you, the artist compresses its length in the direction of the line of sight to create the illusion that it is receding into space. This specific shortening captures how the object would actually appear if you were looking at it from an angle, which is why it exactly demonstrates parts appearing shorter than their true length. Proportion focuses on the relative sizes of different parts within the same subject, but not on how depth affects length. Perspective describes the overall system for representing three-dimensional space on a two-dimensional surface, including vanishing points and convergence lines, rather than the particular shortening of a single part. Scale deals with the overall size of an object relative to a reference, not the internal shortening caused by viewpoint.

Greek architectural orders are the three main column styles used in ancient Greece: Doric, Ionic, and Corinthian. When describing them together, you're referring to the three orders as a group—the three classical orders. The best descriptor is simply listing all three styles because that shows the complete set that defines the collective. These three names form the recognized trio that defines the Greek (and later classical) system of orders.

5. Encaustic painting uses which material as a binder?

Encaustic painting relies on a wax-based binder that is heated to fuse the paint to the surface. The pigment is mixed into beeswax, which melts and can be applied in layers, then fused with heat to create a durable, luminous film as it cools. This wax binder is what gives encaustic its characteristic texture and surface quality. In contrast, linseed oil binds pigments in oil paints, gum arabic is used with watercolors and inks, and acrylic polymer binds pigments in acrylic paints. So beeswax is the binder that defines encaustic painting.

Non-objective painting means creating work without recognizable subjects, focusing on color, line, and gesture rather than depicting people or things. This approach is most closely tied to Abstract Expressionism, a movement that embraces non-representational, emotionally charged imagery and emphasizes the act of painting itself—spontaneity, scale, and the viewer's immediate response. While Surrealism may include abstract elements and the subconscious, it often retains dreamlike or symbolic imagery, whereas Baroque and Rococo are strongly representational and decorative. So the best fit is Abstract Expressionism.

7. In Verrocchio's sculpture of David, which pose is depicted?

The pose being tested is about how a figure can express character through stance. Verrocchio's David is shown with both hands resting on the hips, weight shifted to one leg, which creates a grounded, self-confident silhouette. This hands-on-hips gesture communicates a calm readiness and inner resolve, aligning with Renaissance ideas of portraying a confident, humanized hero. The other described gestures don't fit this sculpture: a single hand on a sword points to a different moment where the weapon dominates the pose; kneeling suggests submission or contemplation; an arm raised in victory signals outward triumph rather than the poised, self-possessed stance Verrocchio chose. So, the depicted pose is hands on hips.

8. Repoussé is a decoration of metal by means of driving back parts of that metal and raising others so that the design stands out in relief.

Repoussé describes a metalworking method where the design is formed by hammering on the back of the metal to push it outward, creating a raised relief that stands out from the surface. The description fits because the metal is driven back in some areas and raised in others to produce a prominent, three-dimensional design. Engraving, in contrast, involves incising or cutting into the surface to create lines and recessed patterns, rather than forming a raised image. A motif is simply the subject or design used, not a technique for shaping metal. Cloisonné is an enameling method that uses wires to create compartments for enamel, again a different process from the raised-relief technique.

9. Which artist is famous for splatter paintings?

Splatter painting centers on the painter's gesture and the physical act of applying paint. Jackson Pollock popularized this approach by laying large canvases on the floor and dripping or flinging paint onto them from brushes, sticks, or by flicking the wrist. This technique creates energetic, spontaneous marks and an all-over surface that emphasizes movement and painting as a record of action, a hallmark of Abstract Expressionism. The other artists are tied to different styles: Picasso is known for Cubism and reshaping form into geometric facets, Monet for capturing light with delicate brushwork in Impressionism, and van Gogh for expressive, thick brushwork and vivid color. Pollock's work is the standout example of splatter/drip painting.

10. Which artist movement is associated with Matisse as a leading figure?

Bold color and expressive brushwork that prioritize emotion over realism define Fauvism, and Henri Matisse is one of its defining leaders. In the early 20th century, he and fellow painters used bright, often nonnatural colors, simplified shapes, and loose, energetic strokes to convey mood rather than optical truth. This approach marked a break from realism and helped establish Fauvism as a distinct movement. Other movements differ in focus: Impressionism centers on capturing fleeting light and atmosphere with delicate, light-filled brushwork; Cubism reshapes forms into geometric facets and multiple viewpoints; Surrealism explores dreamlike, irrational imagery. So Matisse's emphasis on bold color and expressive handling aligns him most closely with Fauvism.
