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Explanations

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1. What is the heliocentric model?

- A. The astronomical model that places the Sun at the center of the solar system**
- B. The model that places Earth at the center

The heliocentric model is the sun-centered arrangement of the solar system, where the Sun sits at the center and the planets orbit around it. This puts Earth among the planets circling the Sun, unlike earlier ideas that placed Earth at the center. By shifting the center of the system, it explains planetary motions more simply, such as the way planets' positions change and why they can appear to move backward in the sky when Earth overtakes them in its orbit. Copernicus introduced this view, and later observations—like the phases of Venus and the moons of Jupiter—provided supporting evidence. So the defining idea is that the Sun is central and the planets, including Earth, revolve around it.

The main idea is how subsistence strategies shape where and how people live. When societies shift to agriculture, they settle down to plant and harvest crops, domesticate animals, and store surplus. That shift creates permanent communities instead of roaming in search of food. So moving away from agriculture describes moving away from a settled, farming-based way of life and back toward a lifestyle that is more nomadic or hunter-gatherer, which is why the nomadic or hunter-gatherer lifestyle is the best fit for what the question is asking.

*Florence, Italy is the city closely tied to Machiavelli's life and work. He was born in Florence and spent most of his career there as a high-ranking official and diplomat for the Florentine Republic. His firsthand experience with Florentine politics, its republican institutions, and the constant power struggles among Italian city-states shaped his writings on statecraft and political power, which in turn influenced Renaissance political thought. He did travel on missions to other places, but Florence was his home base and the setting of his major contributions, such as *The Prince* and the *Discourses*.*

The main concept here is that aging in high-income countries is driven by two forces: low fertility and longer life expectancy. When birth rates stay low, fewer young people enter the workforce, shrinking the base that supports workers and taxpayers. At the same time, people live longer thanks to better health care, nutrition, and living conditions, which raises the share of older individuals in the population. This combination increases the old-age dependency ratio and puts pressure on pension systems, health care, and the labor market. The policy responses listed fit these pressures well. Pension reform aims to keep retirement systems financially sustainable as the number of retirees grows relative to workers. Healthcare expansion addresses the higher demand for elderly and chronic-care services that comes with more older people. Immigration is used to supplement the workforce, helping to balance the population age structure and support public finances. Incentives to raise labor force participation encourage people, including older workers, to stay active in the economy longer, offsetting some of the decline in the ratio of workers to dependents. The other options describe drivers and responses that don't match how aging actually unfolds in wealthy countries. For example, high fertility or shorter life expectancy would slow aging or reverse it, and urbanization or coal power don't target the financial and labor-supply challenges aging creates.

The main concept is identifying the moment that formally ends major fighting in the Civil War—the surrender of a Confederate army to Union forces, signaling the war's practical end. The date most historians cite for this official surrender is April 9, 1865, when General Robert E. Lee surrendered his Army of Northern Virginia to General Ulysses S. Grant at Appomattox Court House in Virginia. That act effectively ended the Civil War in the East and set the pattern for subsequent surrenders of remaining Confederate forces, even though some units did surrender later. The date given in the options that is closest to the actual event is one day later, April 10, 1865, but the surrender itself occurred on the 9th. The other years listed are not related to the war's end.

Florence, Italy is where the Renaissance began because a unique blend of wealth, urban life, and active patronage created the conditions for a revival of classical learning and artistic exploration. The city's merchants and bankers, especially the Medici, funded artists, scholars, and writers, fueling a climate where ideas from ancient Greece and Rome could be rediscovered, studied, and reinterpreted. In Florence, thinkers embraced humanist ideals, while artists experimented with new techniques and subject matter, such as perspective in painting and innovative architectural designs. This combination of financial means, civic pride in antiquity, and a thriving cultural network helped spark a rapid cultural transformation that started in Florence and then spread to other Italian cities and, later, across Europe. While Paris, London, and Constantinople later influenced the broader Renaissance, its earliest expressions were rooted in Florence's distinctive environment.

Michelangelo is famous for monumental works in sculpture and painting, and beyond the Creation of Adam, his most renowned sculpture is the Statue of David. Carved from a single block of marble around 1501–1504, it captures David in a moment of poised tension before the battle with Goliath, celebrated for its extraordinary realism in anatomy and expression. This work became a symbol of Florentine civic pride and Renaissance humanism, and today it stands as a centerpiece of Florence's artistic heritage. The other options belong to different artists—The Birth of Venus is Botticelli, The Thinker is Rodin, and The Kiss is Klimt—so they don't fit Michelangelo's body of work.

8. What was Bismarck's official title while he led the wars against Denmark, Austria, and France?

- A. Prussia's Minister President.
- B. German Chancellor.

The key idea is recognizing Bismarck's official role in that period. During the wars against Denmark, Austria, and France, he controlled the Prussian government as its chief minister, known as Prussia's Minister President. This position made him the main architect of policy and the driving force behind the military campaigns, working under the king of Prussia. The title reflects the constitutional setup of Prussia at the time, before the unification of Germany. He was not the King of Prussia, whose rank was the monarch above him. He was not the Foreign Minister, since his portfolio was the head of the Prussian government, not specifically a foreign-ministry role. And he did not hold the title of German Chancellor during those wars; that office came later, after unification when he became Chancellor of the German Empire in 1871. So, the official title that matches those campaigns is Prussia's Minister President.

9. The Mona Lisa is housed in which city?

The painting's location is Paris. The Mona Lisa, painted by Leonardo da Vinci, is housed in the Louvre Museum in Paris, France, where it sits as a centerpiece of the museum's permanent collection. This is a well-known fact tied to the painting's long association with the Louvre, making Paris the correct city. The other cities—Rome, Florence, and Madrid—are major art centers with their own famous museums, but the Mona Lisa is not located there.

10. Leonardo da Vinci was from which country?

Leonardo da Vinci's origin is tied to Italy. He was born in the town of Vinci, in what is now the Italian region around Florence, during the Renaissance, and he is widely described as an Italian artist, scientist, and inventor. Even though he worked in various Italian cities and spent his final years in France, his birthplace and cultural identity are Italian, so Italy is the country most closely associated with his origins.
