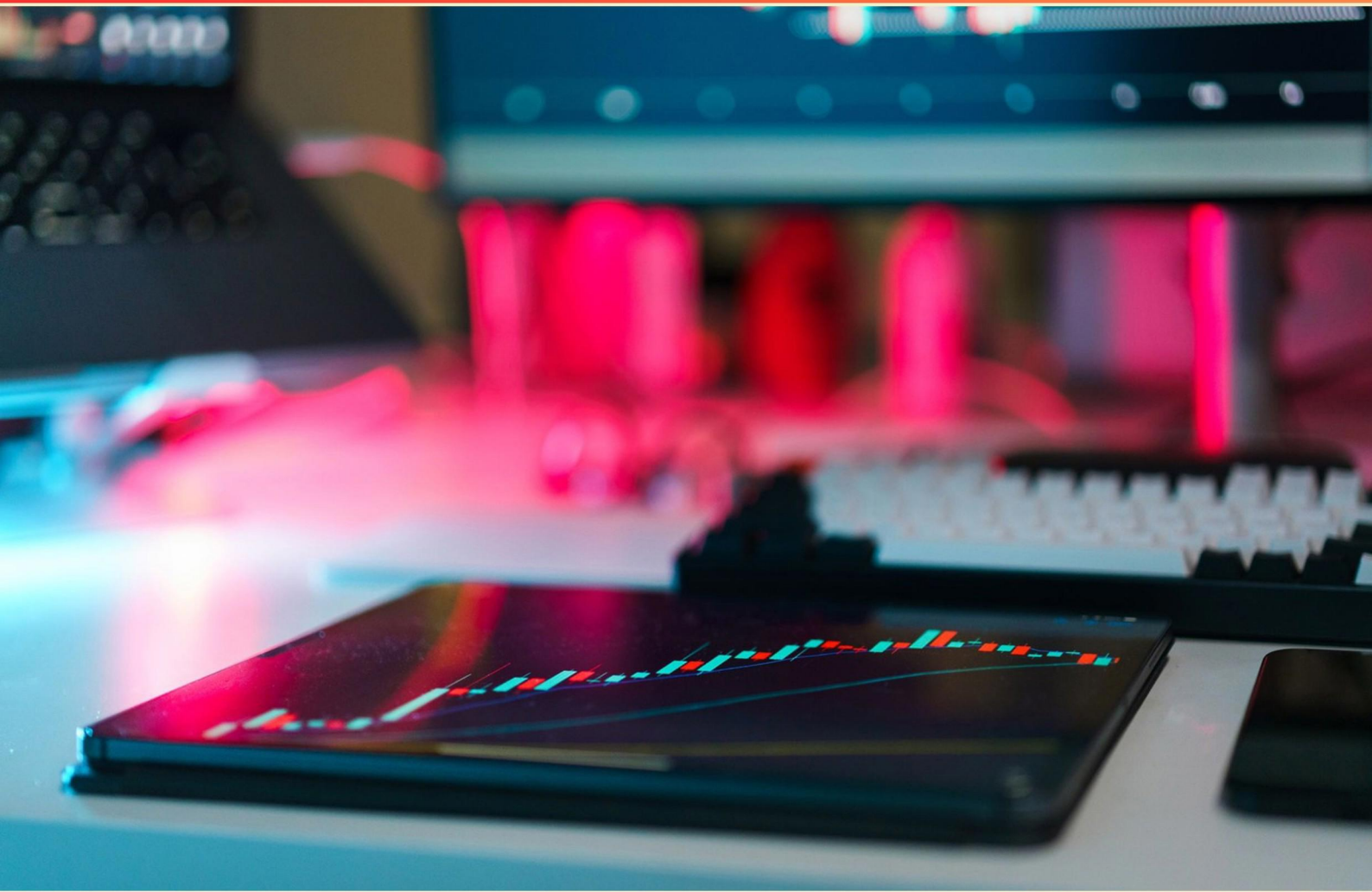

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Explanations

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1. What is referential integrity action on delete/cascade?

- A. Cascade delete propagates deletion to dependent rows.

Referential integrity actions on delete describe what happens to related rows when a row in a parent table is deleted. The cascade option means the delete spreads to dependent rows, so nothing is left orphaned. The restrict or no action option prevents the delete if there are dependent rows, preserving the references. The set null option clears the foreign key in the dependent rows, leaving them intact but no longer linked to the deleted parent. Together, these describe the common ways a database can handle deletions to maintain consistency, which is why this option is the best match.

2. Which feature would you enable to automatically total the numeric data at the end of the table's last column?

The feature you want is the Total Row. It adds a bottom row to the table that is specifically designed to calculate totals for numeric columns. This is exactly what you need to automatically total the numeric data in the final column of the table. Other options describe different kinds of totals that aren't tied to a single table's bottom row: subtotals sum groups within the data, a grand total is the overall sum across multiple sections or tables, and a Sum Row isn't the standard term used for this capability.

A foreign key is a link that ties two tables together. It is an attribute (or a set of attributes) in one table that points to the primary key (or another unique key) in another table, establishing a relationship between the two tables. This link enforces referential integrity, meaning every value in the foreign key must correspond to a valid row in the related table. Because of this connection, you can join the tables in queries and keep related data consistently connected. The other descriptions refer to different concepts: the attribute that uniquely identifies a row in the same table is a primary key; the attribute that ensures uniqueness in a column is a unique key or constraint; and storing derived data describes computed attributes, not a linking mechanism between tables.

The option to create a table from data is found in the tab that handles inserting objects into the document. The Tables group within that tab includes tools to insert a new table, convert existing text to a table, or draw a table. This placement makes sense because a table is something you add to the page, not something you apply as a formatting style. So, you'd go to the tab used for inserting items, and from the Tables group you can create the table directly (for example, by selecting a grid to insert or converting text into a table). Other tabs focus on formatting, data operations, or review tasks, not on inserting new tables.

Referential integrity ensures that relationships between tables stay consistent by enforcing that a foreign key value must correspond to a valid value in the related table's primary key, or be NULL if the relationship allows it. This keeps data linked correctly and prevents references to non-existent records. For example, an orders row with a customer_id must refer to an existing customer in the customers table, so the customer_id must match an existing customers.id value (or be NULL if the design allows that). The other statements describe different database ideas: one talks about limiting how many columns a table can have, another about attributes being derived, and the last about every table having a primary key—none of which describe referential integrity.

6. The Clear Rules from _____ Sheet option within the Conditional Formatting dropdown menu allows users to clear many rules from a spreadsheet all at once.

This is about removing conditional formatting rules on a worksheet in one sweep. Using the option that clears rules from the entire sheet removes every conditional formatting rule applied anywhere on the worksheet, giving you a clean slate across all cells. It's the right pick when your goal is to reset formatting globally rather than leaving rules in other parts of the sheet intact. If you only clear rules in a specific area or in a limited scope, the rest of the sheet would still have its conditional formatting, which is why the entire-sheet option is the broadest and most efficient choice for a full reset.

Structured data in a table form is what Excel can pull from a PDF. When a PDF contains data laid out in rows and columns, the import tools can recognize that grid as a table and convert it into a worksheet with corresponding rows and columns. This makes the data immediately usable in Excel without retyping. In contrast, charts are graphical elements, images are just pictures, and plain text without a clear tabular structure isn't readily mapped into a spreadsheet grid. So the data that can be imported cleanly is data identified as a table.

8. Which feature allows opening and viewing the same workbook in two separate windows?

Opening the same workbook in two separate windows is about creating a second, independent window that reflects the same file. New Window does exactly that by opening a new window tied to the same workbook so you can view different parts simultaneously. The other options don't create a separate window: Split Window divides the current window into panes within one window, Freeze Panes locks headers while you scroll, and View Side by Side arranges two already-open windows for comparison.

9. Which chart type is best suited for comparing multiple series of data?

When you want to compare several data series across the same set of categories, you need a chart that shows each category with multiple values side by side. A clustered column chart does this effectively: for every category along the axis, you get a group of vertical bars, one for each series. This layout makes it easy to see, at a glance, which series is higher within each category and how the series compare across all categories, providing clear, direct magnitude comparisons. A line chart, while great for showing trends over time, can blur exact category-by-category comparisons when multiple series are involved. Pie charts are meant for parts of a whole within a single category and don't handle multiple categories well. A horizontal bar chart can also compare multiple series, but column charts are typically preferred when the goal is straightforward vertical comparison across many categories.

10. The Move or Copy Sheet option can be found in which tab and group?

Moving or duplicating entire worksheets is a sheet-management task, so it sits where Excel groups commands that affect the workbook's structure. The Move or Copy Sheet option is on the Home tab, specifically in the Cells group. This placement makes sense because it's about organizing sheets—a structural action—alongside other sheet-related controls like inserting or deleting sheets that you also access from the Home tab's Cells area. You can also reach it by right-clicking a sheet tab, but via the Ribbon path the designated location is Home > Cells > Move or Copy Sheet. Remember, this dialog lets you choose the destination and, if you want a duplicate, check Create a copy.
