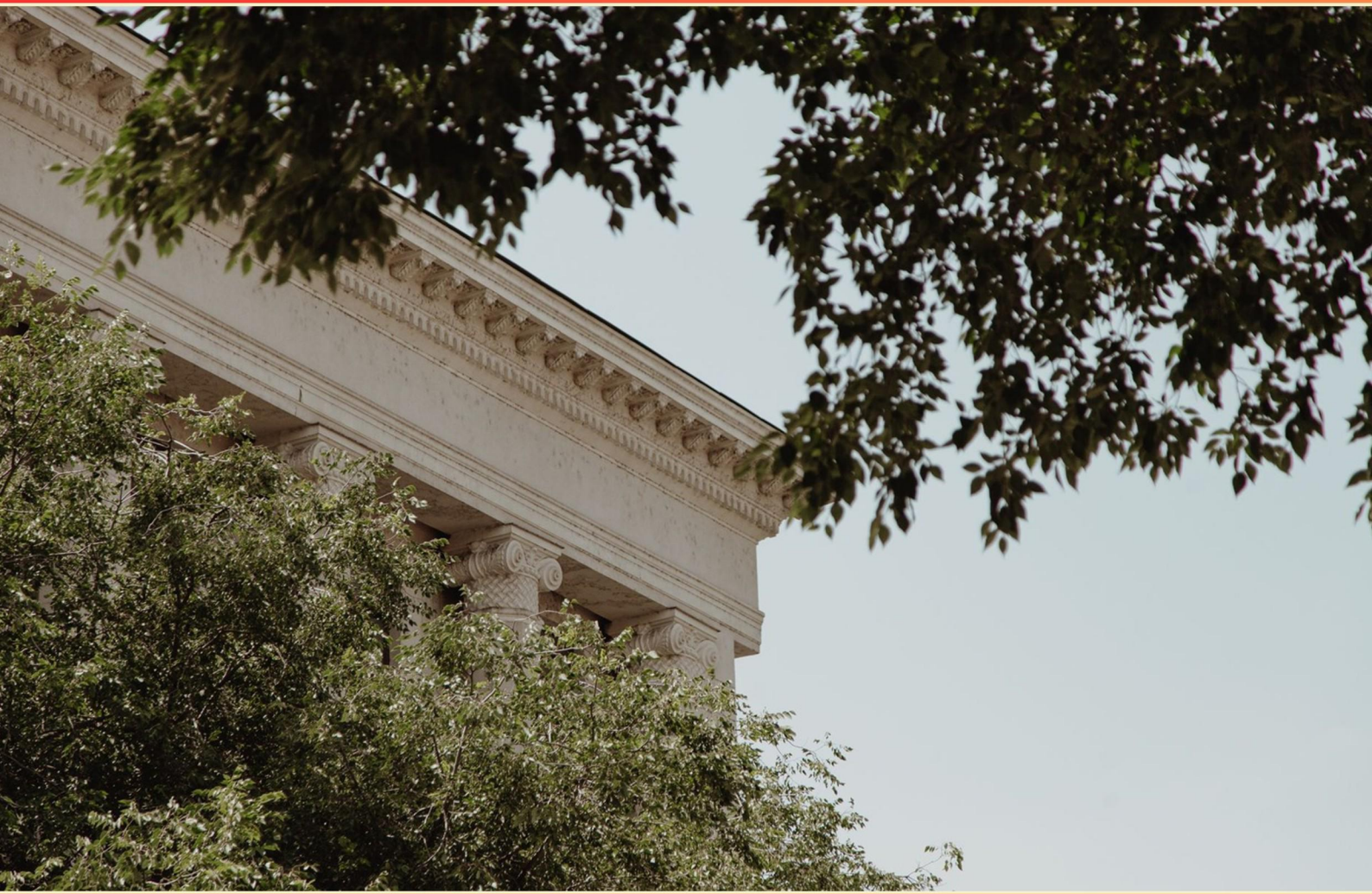

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Explanations

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1. Concurrent powers are powers shared by both national and state governments. Which of the following is a typical example?

- A. Issuing currency
- B. Taxation**

Concurrent powers are shared by national and state governments, meaning both levels can exercise certain authority to serve the public and fund services. Taxation fits this pattern because both the federal government and state governments have the power to levy taxes to raise revenue for public goods like schools, roads, and national defense. This dual ability is a fundamental feature of federalism: while the national government handles nationwide needs, states handle local needs, yet both pull in tax revenue to support their programs. The other options illustrate powers that are primarily or exclusively national. Issuing currency is handled by the federal government to maintain a single, unified monetary system. Granting patents is governed by federal patent law and the USPTO. Immigration policy is overseen at the national level by Congress and federal agencies. Therefore, taxation is the typical concurrent power because it is clearly exercised by both levels of government.

The Sixth Amendment builds a set of protections that ensure a fair criminal trial. It guarantees a speedy and public trial to prevent unnecessary delays and secrecy, and an impartial jury drawn from the community to decide the case. It also ensures the defendant knows the charges against them so they can prepare a defense, and the right to confront and cross-examine witnesses who testify for the prosecution. Finally, it guarantees the assistance of counsel, including the right to have a lawyer—even if the defendant cannot afford one. These elements collectively ensure the defendant can mount an informed, effective defense in a transparent proceeding. Other options mix in rights from other amendments—grand jury and double jeopardy are Fifth Amendment protections; confronting judges isn't the right idea (the protection is to confront witnesses); civil-trial-by-jury and excessive-bail rights come from the Seventh and Eighth Amendments, not the Sixth.

Federalism is the system that divides authority between national and regional governments. It sets up how powers are allocated so the national government can handle issues that affect the country as a whole (like defense and interstate trade) while regional governments retain control over local matters (such as education and local policing). This arrangement also allows for shared or concurrent powers where both levels can act, along with mechanisms that prevent any one level from becoming all-powerful. The result is a balance that preserves national unity and also lets states tailor policies to their communities, encouraging experimentation and responsiveness to local needs. Direct Democracy focuses on how people vote on laws rather than how power is distributed between levels of government. Popular sovereignty is the idea that the people hold ultimate authority, but it doesn't specify the division of power across national and state governments. Judicial Review is about courts interpreting laws, not how authority is split between levels of government.

Habeas corpus is the right to bring a person who is being detained before a court to determine whether the detention is lawful. This protects people from unlawful imprisonment by requiring a valid legal justification for holding someone and giving them a chance to challenge the detention in court. The idea, from Latin meaning "you shall have the body," has long stood as a fundamental safeguard in many legal systems, ensuring due process and preventing arbitrary state confinement. It's not about detaining people without trial, nor about how judges are chosen, nor about publishing laws for public knowledge—that's a different governmental function.

Keeping and bearing arms is what the Second Amendment protects. A political ideology is a system of beliefs about how government should function and what it should prioritize. This worldview determines which policy directions you support and how you view the role of government in society. If you favor limited government and free markets, you'll gravitate toward policies that emphasize deregulation, lower taxes, and individual responsibility. If you prioritize equality and social safety nets, you'll champion broader government programs and protections. Because these beliefs create a coherent set of preferred solutions, they also help explain why people rally around certain political parties that share those viewpoints and how different groups align on policy platforms. In short, an ideology provides the lens through which people interpret issues, choose policies, and decide which party best represents their values, shaping both policy positions and party alignment.

7. Who authored the Declaration of Independence, drawing on Enlightenment ideas?

The main idea here is identifying who wrote the Declaration and understanding how Enlightenment thinking influenced it. Thomas Jefferson was the primary drafter of the Declaration for the Continental Congress in 1776. He embedded Enlightenment principles, drawing on ideas like natural rights—the belief that people have inherent rights such as life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness—and the notion that governments derive their authority from the governed and should protect those rights. The famous line about “unalienable rights” and government by consent reflects this influence and shows why independence was framed as a political necessity to secure those rights. Other figures were involved in the process and the broader independence movement, but they did not write the document itself. James Madison would later become key in shaping the Constitution, John Adams was a leading advocate and part of the drafting group, and Benjamin Franklin contributed to persuasion and editing. Yet the language and core argument of the Declaration come from Jefferson, with Enlightenment ideas clearly echoed throughout.

The key idea here is equal representation in legislative districts and the power of the courts to enforce it when population shifts create unequal voting power. Baker v. The Supreme Court ruled that legislative apportionment must be guided by the principle that each person's vote has roughly equal weight, so districts must have roughly equal populations. This opened the door to the "one person, one vote" standard and led to reforms in how states redraw districts to ensure equal representation. For context, later cases built on this foundation to tighten the requirement that both houses of state legislatures be apportioned by population. Other landmark cases you might know—Marbury v. Madison established judicial review, Roe v. Wade addressed abortion rights, and McCulloch v. Maryland dealt with federal power—do not address district population equality.

Judicial review is the power of courts to interpret the Constitution and strike down laws or government actions that conflict with it. This matters because it keeps the Constitution as the supreme law of the land, with the judiciary serving as a check on both the legislature and the executive. The idea was established in the U.S. through the principle affirmed by the landmark case Marbury v. Madison, which held that courts can review and overturn laws or orders that violate the Constitution. Because of judicial review, courts can protect fundamental rights and ensure government actions stay within constitutional limits, maintaining the balance among the branches. The other terms describe different concepts: federalism is about how power is shared between national and state governments; monarchy and theocracy refer to forms of government ruled by a monarch or by religious authorities. None of those names captures the specific role of courts determining constitutional compliance.

The key idea is recognizing which constitutional change guarantees voting rights for women. The amendment that does this states that the right to vote cannot be denied or abridged on account of sex and it was ratified in 1920. This formally secured women's suffrage nationwide, ending decades of state-by-state limitations. By comparison, the 15th Amendment addresses voting rights based on race, color, or previous condition of servitude (not gender); the 26th Amendment lowered the voting age to 18; and the 1st Amendment protects freedoms like speech, religion, and assembly, not voting qualifications. So, the amendment that granted women the right to vote is the one ratified in 1920 that forbids sex-based voting discrimination.
