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Explanations

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1. What emotion becomes more intense as conditions worsen?

When conditions worsen, emotional responses intensify because threat and stress become more real, pushing us to react more strongly. Fear rises as danger feels closer and safety feels at stake, triggering protective vigilance. Anger often grows with frustration, loss of control, or perceived injustice in the face of mounting obstacles, spurring a push to take action or push back. Together, these emotions sharpen as the stakes increase and options feel limited. By contrast, hope and confidence tend to fade when outcomes look bleak, and indifference isn't a typical response when real threats or strong challenges loom.

The question tests your ability to infer a character's age from how he's described and what his life has been like. Jim Casy is presented as a former preacher who has spent many years moving from town to town, talking and thinking deeply about people and life. The narrative gives him a weathered, seasoned feel rather than the brightness or impatience you'd expect in a younger man. That combination of long experience, reflective speech, and a life spent on the road signals middle age, about forty years old. The other options don't fit that sense of having accumulated years of experience and travel; he's clearly older than a child or a teenager, but not so old as to seem well into later middle age or old age. So the best choice is around forty.

3. What crime did Tom commit to end up in jail?

Tom Joad ends up in jail because he killed a man during a fight, serving a four-year term for murder. This act is central to his backstory and explains how his past weighs on him as he moves into the wider troubles of the family's journey. The other options don't fit the narrative: there isn't a robbery, extortion, or drunken-driving incident tied to his imprisonment. Focusing on the murder shows why his history matters to the themes of justice, responsibility, and resilience in the story.

4. The gas station owner gave the Joads gas.

The situation being tested focuses on recalling exactly how help appears in a roadside moment of the Joads' journey. In the scene with the gas station, the narrative does not present the owner giving them gas as a free gift. The text emphasizes the migrants' precarious finances and the transactional nature of most aid they encounter, so fuel is not depicted as something handed to them without cost or exchange. That's why the statement isn't accurate.

5. Why is the Farmer's Association uncomfortable with the government camps?

The main idea being tested is fear of political influence and the potential spread of radical ideas through government programs. The Association fears that such camps could empower workers, disrupt established power dynamics, and challenge their authority, so labeling the camps as filled with communists becomes a way to delegitimize the program and protect their interests. The other options miss the real tension here—it's not about taking away workers, higher pay, or nicer facilities, but about political influence and fear of radical organizing.

6. Steinbeck derived the title *Grapes of Wrath* from which work?

By borrowing this phrase, Steinbeck signals that the novel will explore the fierce anger and moral struggle of oppressed people—the migrant farmers driven from their homes and treated unjustly during the Dust Bowl era. The reference frames the book as a moral drama about collective suffering, resistance, and the potential for social reckoning. The other options are famous patriotic songs, but they do not contain the phrase or serve as the source Steinbeck chose.

7. Which statement describes Casey's fate during the strike?

The key idea here is that Casey's fate highlights the danger and cost of organizing during the strike. This moment underscores the brutality faced by the labor movement and serves as a turning point for Tom Joad, who resolves to carry on Casey's spirit and the struggle itself. The other possibilities—being jailed, leaving the strike, or forgiving someone—do not align with what the text shows; Casey's death is the event that occurs, inflicted by a policeman.

8. Ruthie's lesson about waiting her turn involves which game?

Waiting your turn is built into croquet, a lawn game that unfolds in a clear sequence and social rhythm. Croquet's calm, social nature reinforces this idea more directly than the other games. Hopscotch tends to be fast and individual, focusing on counting and quick participation. Badminton is fast-paced and rally-driven, where play moves quickly from one side to the other. Baseball involves teamwork and a variety of actions, but the specific habit of waiting for one's turn in a small, social moment is most closely tied to croquet in this context.

The amount they have for the trip is a small, crucial sum that underscores their precarious situation as they head west. In the story, they set out with about one hundred fifty dollars in savings, a modest pool of cash they plan to use for fuel, food, and a few essential supplies on the road. This tiny nest egg shows just how little financial cushion they have, which in turn highlights the themes of hardship, risk, and reliance on work and hospitality that run through the migrant journey. The other amounts would imply more security than the text allows, so the figure of one hundred fifty dollars best fits the portrayal of their starting resources.

10. How is aid distributed in Weedpatch?

A. Through camp distribution; recipients repay or work off aid.

B. Cash aid from outside charities.

Aid in Weedpatch is organized through the camp's own system, not handed out as cash from outside groups. Residents receive what they need through camp distribution, and they repay or "work off" that aid by doing chores and labor around the camp. This setup reflects a sense of order and dignity the camp tries to maintain: help is earned through work, not simply given as a charity. It contrasts with the idea of cash donations from outsiders and with the notion that no aid is available, while also going beyond a strictly "in kind only" arrangement by tying the aid to the residents' labor.
