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Explanations

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1. In the passage, the label Reds is associated with anger over which behavior by the Okies?

- A. Wanting better wages
- B. Being dirty
- C. Begging
- D. Criminal activities

The idea being tested is how language labels reveal why people react with anger toward a group. In the passage, calling the Okies "Reds" shows a smear that ties their actions to political radicalism. The anger isn't about cleanliness, begging, or criminal acts; it's about the Okies pushing for better wages and fair pay. By portraying them as "Reds," the speaker frames their wage demands as a dangerous, even subversive challenge to the social order and to the owners' profits. This makes the economic demand—seeking higher wages—the focal point of the hostility.

2. How much do the Joads earn for picking peaches at five cents a box?

- A. \$10
- B. \$5

Unit rate multiplied by quantity is how you find total earnings. If the pay is five cents per box, that's \$0.05 for each box. To make \$1, you'd need $1 \div 0.05 = 20$ boxes. So $20 \text{ boxes} \times \$0.05 \text{ per box} = \$1$. This shows how the total comes from the rate applied to the number of boxes. If they picked 0 boxes, it would be \$0; more boxes would yield higher totals (e.g., 100 boxes would be \$5).

3. Who plans the escape from the Hooper camp?

Leadership under pressure shapes who plans the escape in this moment. Ma Joad stepped into the role of organizer, weighing the risks of staying at the Hooper camp and mapping out a practical path for the family. She focuses on concrete details that keep everyone safe and coordinated—what to pack, where to head next, and how to move without drawing danger. Her steady, resourceful approach turns worry into a clear, actionable plan, showing how she anchors the family and guides them through uncertainty. This kind of leadership fits Ma's character: she's the one who holds the family together, balances care with practicality, and makes sure hopes don't dissolve into panic. In contrast, Pa tends to react in the moment with protection in mind, Tom is driven by his own sense of justice and urgency, and Al is younger and less equipped to steady the group with a long-range plan. Ma's ability to foresee needs and coordinate steps is what makes her the one who plans the escape.

4. Excluding Casy, the number of Joads who die or leave the family is

This question tests tracking the Joads' fates as they wander: count every Joad who dies or permanently leaves the family, and exclude the friend-ally Casy from the count. If you go through the narrative and note each time a Joad is no longer part of the family unit—by death or by choosing to leave—you'll reach six such fates. This isn't about how many remain in the caravan at any one point, but about every instance a blood relative is no longer part of the Joads due to death or a permanent departure. Four or Five would miss one or more of these fates, and Seven would include an event that isn't a death or a permanent departure. Six is the total that fits the sequence of events, excluding Casy.

5. Which town is described as having its own local government and a Ladies Committee?

*The question hinges on recognizing a place in *Grapes of Wrath* that is shown as a self-governing migrant community with a formal local structure and a Ladies Committee. Weedpatch is that place. Steinbeck presents Weedpatch as a government-run camp with its own local government, and within the camp there is a Ladies Committee that helps manage the community, welfare, and camp rules. This setup illustrates a more organized, communal approach to migrant life and highlights women playing a direct role in governance and care for the residents. The other towns listed are real places in California and don't fit the description of a migrant camp with its own local government and a Ladies Committee in the narrative.*

6. Who ended up with the rest of the pork and the six bales of wire?

Leadership and resource distribution under pressure. In the Joad family, the father is the one who decides what remains and how it's allocated, reflecting his role as the head of the household. When the rest of the pork and the six bales of wire are accounted for, Pa ends up with them because it's his responsibility to guard and distribute the family's possessions for the road ahead. Ma tends to daily care and meals, but the practical call about keeping supplies for survival and mobility falls to Pa. Tom is a family member, not the decision-maker in this moment, and Grandfather's age and condition mean he isn't taking charge. So Pa ends up with the rest of the pork and the six bales of wire, illustrating his authority and role in keeping the family organized and moving.

7. Who initially refuses to accept help for the Wilsons?

The main idea this question tests is how pride and independence interact with charity in tough times. Ivy's initial refusal to accept help for the Wilsons shows a stubborn sense of dignity—she wants to handle things on their own and avoid appearing needy or burdensome. In the story, characters navigate whether to rely on themselves or lean on the community, and Ivy embodies that pull toward self-reliance even when help is offered. This moment sets up the broader theme that generosity and solidarity are essential in hardship, even if someone resists at first. While Ma and others tend to move toward practical aid and community support, Ivy's stance captures the tension between preserving pride and accepting assistance.

8. What is the nature of the portions of the book that do not follow the actual plot?

- A. They deal with another sub-plot

The parts that don't follow the immediate plot are there to provide symbolic commentary and broader context. Steinbeck uses intercalary chapters to step back from the family's direct journey and show the larger forces at work—the Dust Bowl's devastation, economic hardship, and the humanity of migrant workers. These sections illuminate why the family travels, deepen the novel's themes, and connect their individual struggles to the wider social reality, rather than presenting a separate storyline. They're not extra plotlines or filler; they're purposeful reflections that reinforce the main narrative by using symbolism and broader social insight.

9. Why were Okies nicknamed Reds in the described passage?

This question focuses on how the nickname Reds is used to signal the Okies' situation as laborers seeking fair pay. In the passage, the term is tied to their push for higher wages and better conditions, not to personal cleanliness, criminal activity, or begging. The red association here suggests labor movement imagery—the idea of workers banding together and protesting pay—so the nickname flags economic motivation and collective action rather than moral judgments about appearance or behavior. The other options don't fit because the text doesn't frame the label in terms of dirt, crime, or begging; it centers on wage struggles and labor rights.

10. Anyone who breaks Weedpatch laws is warned how many times before being banished from the camp?

Two warnings precede banishment in Weedpatch. This rule shows the camp's emphasis on order and fair treatment: when someone breaks a law, they're given a chance to correct their behavior, and only after a second lapse are they expelled. It reflects a community that values self-governance and mutual responsibility, aiming to protect the group's safety and harmony while still offering a path back in if one chooses to reform. The twice-before-banished policy also helps distinguish Weedpatch from harsher camps, highlighting Steinbeck's depiction of a more humane, organized space for migrant families.
