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Explanations

In contrast, an offside call results in an indirect free kick being awarded to the opposing team rather than a penalty kick. Similarly, a throw-in violation leads to a throw-in for the opposing team and not a penalty kick, and an indirect free kick offense requires that the free kick be taken from where the offense occurred, rather than granting a penalty kick. Thus, penalties are specifically reserved for certain offenses within the penalty area, with handballs being one of the clear cases that invoke this punishment.
