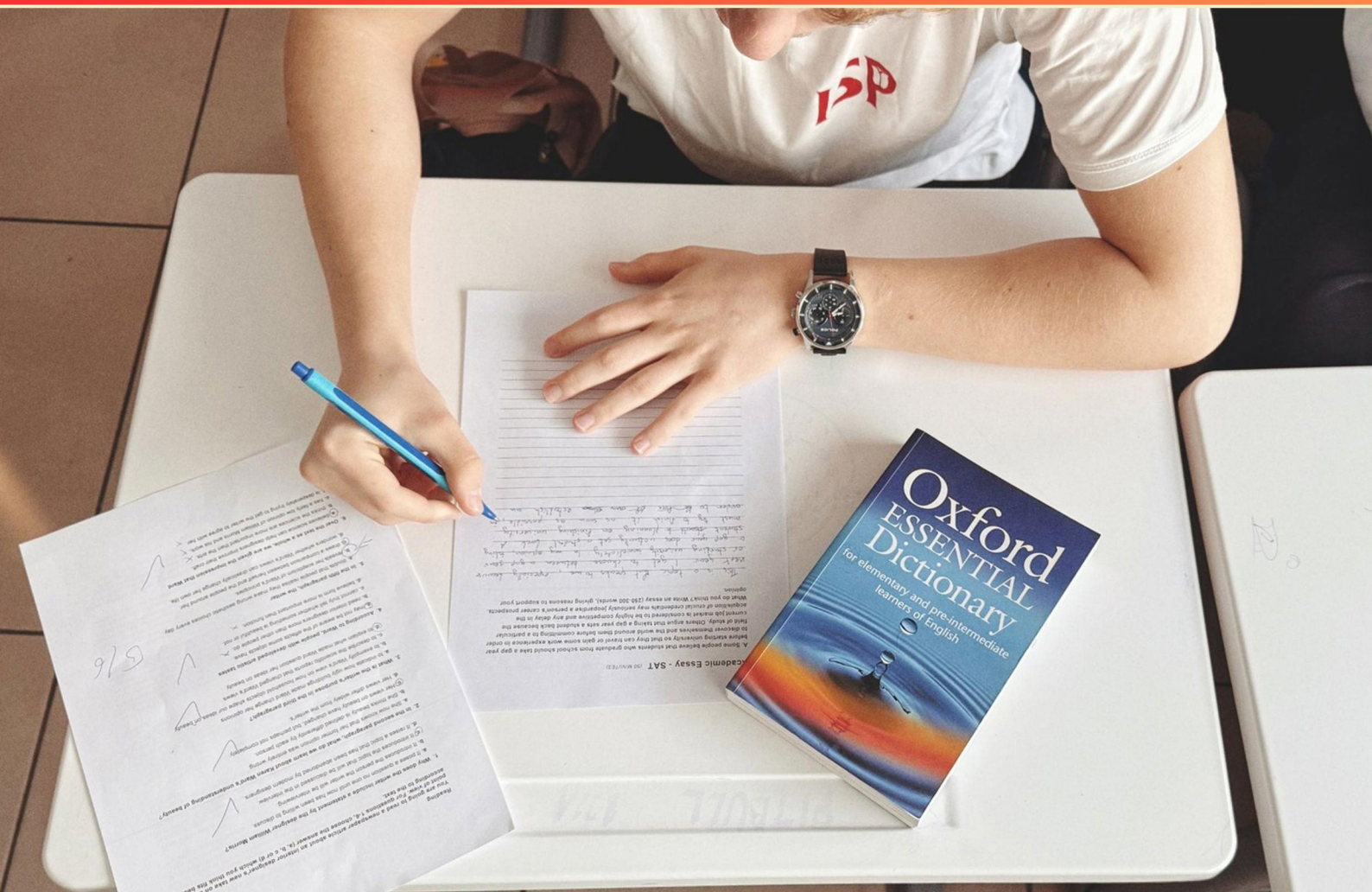

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Explanations

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1. Which word means reticent?

- A. Silent, reserved**
- B. Motionless
- C. Sate
- D. Unemotional lacking sensitivity

Reticent centers on being restrained in speech and not readily revealing thoughts. The best match is "silent, reserved" because it directly conveys someone who speaks little and keeps feelings or opinions to themselves. The other options describe things that aren't about talking: motionless is about not moving, sate is about satisfying appetite, and unemotional lacking sensitivity describes emotional posture rather than speech.

2. Which word means 'to set right, to free from error'?

For example: "As the deadline loomed, she began to waver between accepting the offer and staying at her current job."

So pristine is the best match for fresh and clean; uncorrupted.

The main idea here is spotting a term that signals a lack of originality—something that's predictable, overused, and dull. Banal fits this exactly. Audacious means bold or daring, which is the opposite of dull and predictable. Assuage means to ease or calm, which isn't about originality or interest. Candid means honest and straightforward, not boring or repetitive.

Feigning illness to avoid responsibilities is the idea here. Malingering means to pretend to be ill in order to escape work or duties. It implies a deliberate deception aimed at shirking obligation, not simply being sick or lazy. As a verb, you can say someone malingered to dodge a task, or that they are malingering. For contrast, to laud is to praise highly, obdurate describes stubborn refusal, and obsequious means excessively eager to please—none of these involve pretending to be ill to avoid duties.
