A stimulant, as mentioned in another option, is conversely designed to increase energy and alertness, which is contrary to the sedative nature of narcotics. Lastly, a herbal remedy may be used for pain relief but does not qualify as a narcotic since it does not possess the properties associated with medicinal narcotics or opioids.

Guam's over-the-counter (OTC) purchase limits for pseudoephedrine (PSE) are indeed stricter than those set by federal law. In contrast, Guam has implemented measures that further restrict these limits to enhance control over the potential misuse of these medications. By imposing stricter limits, Guam aims to mitigate the risk of illegal methamphetamine production, which is often facilitated through the purchase of large quantities of pseudoephedrine. These additional state regulations reflect local concerns regarding substance abuse and the management of public health issues, highlighting the authority of Guam to establish more stringent rules than those prescribed at the federal level.
