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Explanations

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1. What note is located on the 12th fret of the 3rd string?

- A. F
- B. A
- C. G**

To determine what note is located on the 12th fret of the 3rd string, it's important to know the standard tuning of the guitar strings. The 3rd string in standard tuning is the G string.
