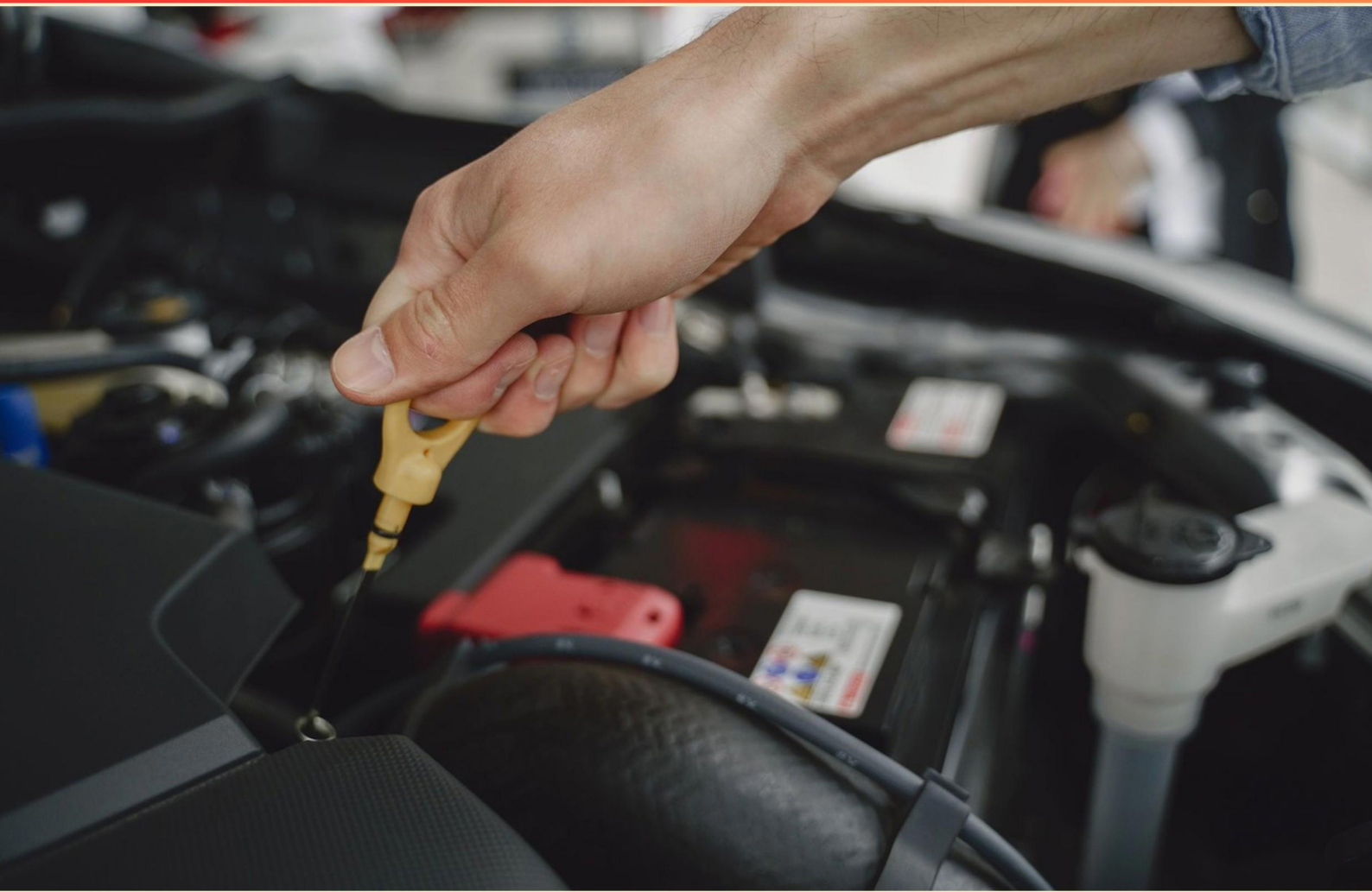

Clearance lamps on multipurpose passenger vehicles that are 80 inches or more in overall width must be amber in color.
