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1. Which mountain range separates Europe from Asia?

The Andes are the longest mountain range in the world, located in South America, while the Rocky Mountains are found in North America. The Himalayas are situated in Asia and are known for being the highest mountain range in the world, but they do not play a role in separating Europe and Asia. Thus, the Ural Mountains are the correct answer due to their established role in continental demarcation.

Condensation is the process by which water vapor turns into liquid water, commonly observed in the formation of clouds or dew, but does not involve ice advancing over land. Desiccation describes the process of drying out or evaporation, which is also unrelated to the concept of ice advancing. Therefore, glaciation is the correct term for the phenomenon of large areas of land being covered by ice.

Thus, the distinct and iconic fjords of Norway set it apart as the correct answer.
