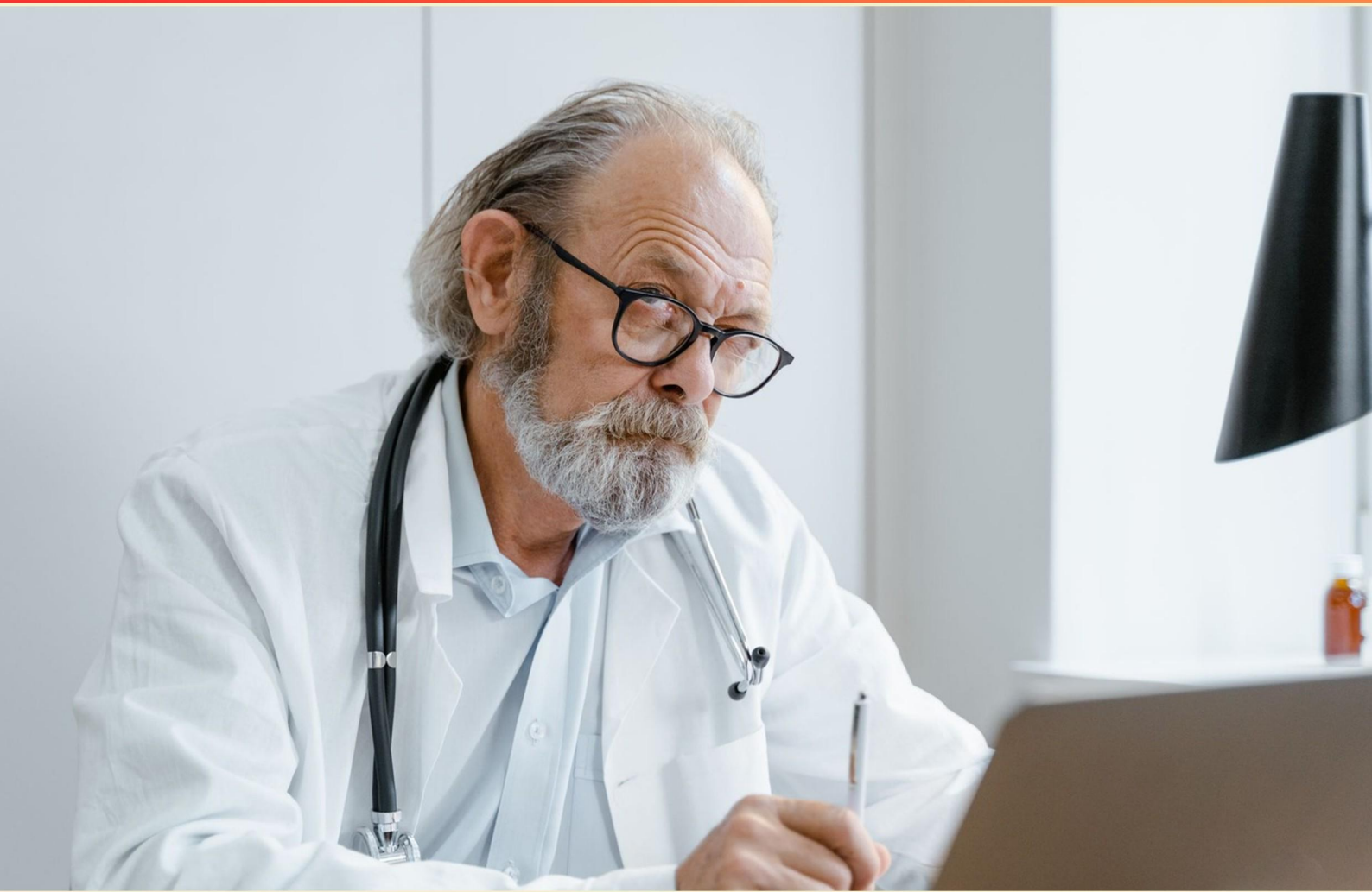

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Explanations

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1. Which term describes a person who has no interest or involvement in political affairs?

- A. Infrastructure
- B. Apolitical**

Apolitical describes a person who has no interest or involvement in political affairs. The prefix a- means "not," so apolitical means not engaged in politics, signaling neutrality or disengagement from political matters. This directly matches the idea of someone who does not participate in political life. The other terms describe things rather than a personal stance: infrastructure refers to the physical systems that support society (like roads and utilities); convergence means the coming together or merging of different trends or technologies; policy is a deliberate plan or course of action adopted by a government or organization. So apolitical is the best fit for describing someone who does not involve themselves in political affairs.

Autonomy is the capacity to govern your own life, including medical choices. The act or power of making one's own decisions is captured by self-determination, often framed as the right to self-determination. It underpins informed consent and the obligation to respect a patient's choices, even when they differ from what a clinician would prefer. For example, a patient may decline a recommended procedure or choose a treatment that aligns with their values. In contrast, a committee is a group that decides collectively, leverage is about using power to influence outcomes, and reciprocity refers to mutual obligation—none describe an individual's control over their own decisions.

Innovation is about bringing something new into use—an original idea, a new method, or a device that changes how things are done and usually aims to improve outcomes, efficiency, or experience. The other terms don't capture that sense of novelty and practical change: an audience is who a message reaches, a resource is what you use to accomplish tasks, and an opinion is a belief or judgment. In health care, recognizing something as an innovation means it represents a departure from the status quo with potential benefits, while still needing careful evaluation of safety, effectiveness, and ethical considerations. Examples include a new telehealth platform, a wearable device that monitors vitals, or a redesigned clinical workflow that speeds up care.

This item highlights patient autonomy—the right of individuals to make their own decisions about their care. Justice is the quality of being just, impartial, or fair. The other terms describe something different: misinformation is false or misleading information, a free rider benefits without contributing, and a mentor is someone who guides and teaches.

Sovereignty deals with ultimate authority within a political state, not with leadership dynamics inside a group. Propaganda refers to biased messaging used to influence opinions, not to a leadership role. In contexts like policy or organizational change, grasstops are the people who can most directly set agendas and move initiatives forward.

Discrimination based on age, particularly against older adults, is described by the term ageism. Discrimination, in general, is about unfair treatment based on any protected characteristic, but it's less precise about the particular social pattern tied to aging. Ageism is the most comprehensive term here because it names the social and systemic pattern of discrimination rooted in aging, not just a single act or a negative belief.

Sovereignty is the term for the supreme, final authority a state has to govern itself and its population without external control. The other concepts don't describe that ultimate, self-contained authority: federalism involves distributing power between national and regional governments; a constitution is a formal document outlining government structure and powers but doesn't itself denote ultimate authority; propaganda is a tool used to influence public opinion, not a description of political sovereignty.

In contrast, grassroots refers to the broad base of ordinary members who participate and advocate but don't sit at the top of the decision-making chain. Federalism and constitution describe broader governmental structures and legal frameworks, not the internal levels of influence within a group. So, the term that denotes the most senior level of an organization or group where people are influential within their hierarchy is grasstop.

The main concept is identifying which part of government handles making laws, setting taxes, and funding government activities. The body that fits this role is the legislative branch. It also controls fiscal policy by approving taxes and directing how funds are spent through appropriations, which means deciding the budget for programs, including those in healthcare. The executive branch enforces laws and runs government programs, while the judiciary interprets laws and resolves disputes. Terms like policy makers describe people who work on public policy in general, but they don't designate a specific branch; credible and role model refer to personal qualities, not institutional functions.
