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Explanations

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1. What best describes the Refusal of Call in Theseus's journey?

The Refusal of the Call shows the hero resisting the urge to start the adventure, often because someone important or the safety of loved ones weighs on them. In Theseus's story, his father's objection captures that pull to stay home and protect him: the king doesn't want to send his son away because he fears sacrificing his only child. This hesitation from a trusted guardian blocks the step into danger, illustrating how the call can be met with resistance from those who care about the hero. The other options miss this dynamic: denying hearing the call would be a direct self-block, fearing the Minotaur would be the danger of the quest itself, and banishment has no bearing on the moment of resisting the call.

The event that best captures this is the combination of the Witch's defeat in Oz—making it clear she's truly in a new realm—and then Dorothy stepping onto the road to begin the journey to meet the Wizard. This shows both entering the special world and choosing to pursue the quest, which is the essence of crossing the threshold. The other moments—returning to Kansas, meeting the Scarecrow, or discovering the Ruby Slippers—are about later stages or different functions (regression, allies, or tools) rather than the decisive shift from the ordinary world to the adventure.

The other descriptions miss that balance: a mentor who just grants magical powers isn't the usual teaching figure, staying with the hero through the entire journey hinders growth, and leaving the hero to figure things out alone misses the guiding purpose that initiates and supports development.

The idea of receiving a broom is not part of the story's reward, and the Wizard's role isn't to grant the group new powers or to hand out medals. Meeting Glinda is a guiding moment, not the reward. So the best understanding is that Dorothy's reward is the magical ruby slippers that enable her to go back to Kansas.

The kingdom gains safety and the people gain memory of a leader who gave everything for them, which is the essence of returning from the ordeal transformed and with an enduring boon. The other possibilities don't center on that final, transformative confrontation with death and the lasting benefit it brings to the community.

This guidance from a trusted elder figure—rooted in lineage and duty—embodies the mentor's job of steering the hero toward action. While Rafiki serves as a wise counselor in the story, the transformative push that realigns Simba with his path comes through his father's spiritual guidance.

This complete journey—from ordinary world to initiation and return with newfound power and responsibility—is the clearest fit for the Hero's Journey. Hermione Granger and Harry Potter do narratively follow a similar arc in their stories, and Tony Stark is another modern example of this pattern, but Luke Skywalker is often cited as the quintessential, textbook instance of the journey in action, making him the best illustration in this context.

Defeating the Minotaur and entering the labyrinth happen after this departure; they are part of the trials within the special world rather than the moment of crossing itself. Returning to Athens occurs after the journey, not at its start.
