Periapical radiographs are designed to show the entire tooth, including its root structure and surrounding bone, but they do not provide a full view of the entire mouth at once. Cone beam CT, while advanced and highly detailed, is used in more specialized cases like implant planning and usually involves greater exposure to radiation and
