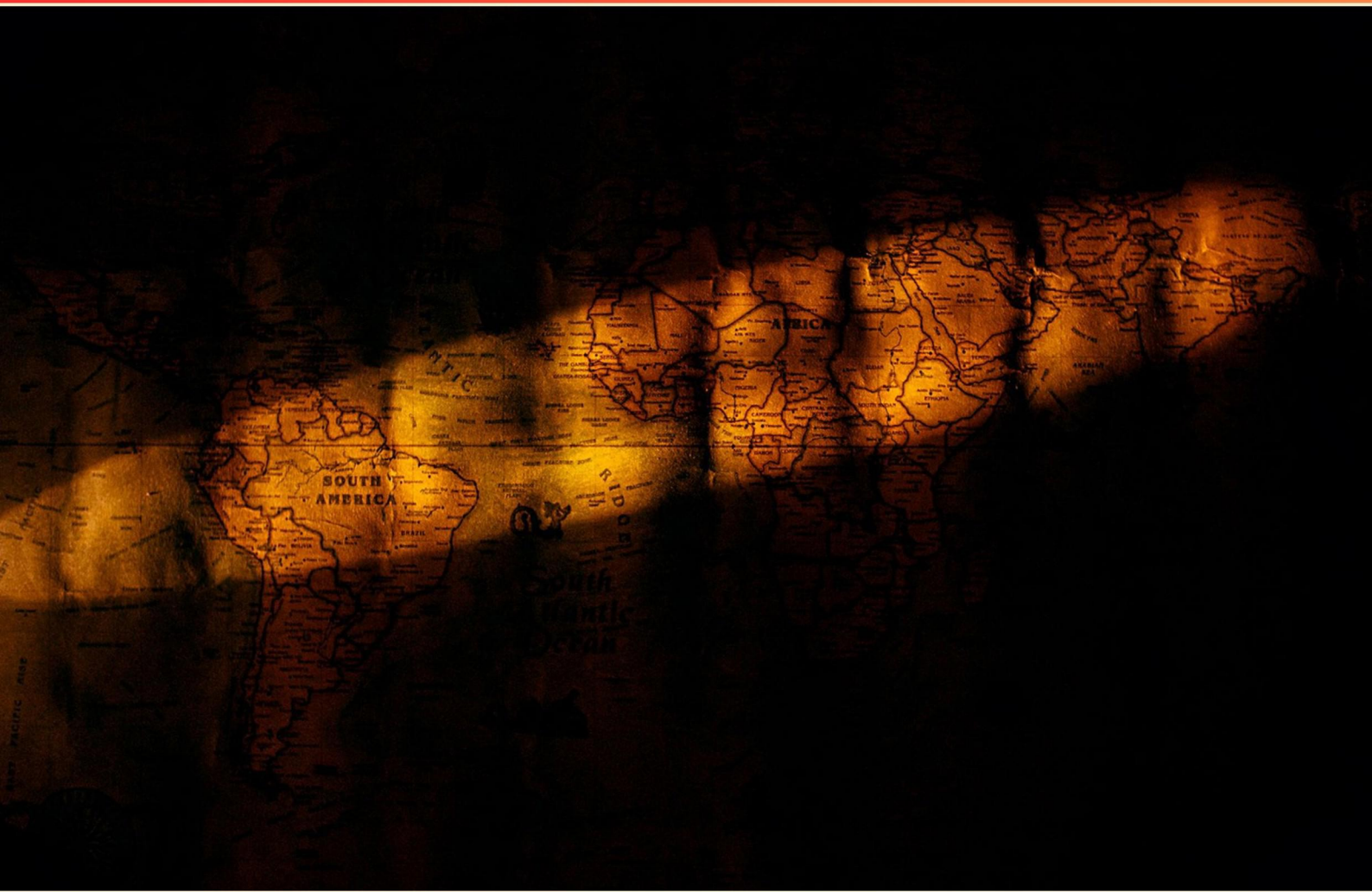

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Explanations

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1. What anti-black group formed in the South in response to Reconstruction policies?

- A. White League
- B. Sons of Liberty
- C. Liberation Party
- D. Ku Klux Klan**

The anti-black backlash after the Civil War was carried out by groups intent on restoring white supremacy and overturning Reconstruction gains. The Ku Klux Klan fits this pattern best: formed by former Confederates in the South right after the war, it quickly turned into a secret society that used threats, violence, and terror to suppress African American civic participation and intimidate supporters of Reconstruction. Their violence aimed to restore white political dominance by intimidating Black voters, teachers, and leaders, and by burning schools and churches to undermine newly won rights. Other groups mentioned are not the same era or purpose. The White League emerged a bit later in Louisiana as another white supremacist force, but it's not the central emblem of Reconstruction-era resistance. The Sons of Liberty points to a Revolutionary-era group, long before Reconstruction, and the Liberation Party isn't a recognized Reconstruction-era organization. So the Ku Klux Klan best embodies the anti-black reaction to Reconstruction policies.

2. Which city hosted the Constitutional Convention of 1787?

The question is testing your knowledge of where the event that produced the framework for the U.S. Constitution took place. In the summer of 1787, delegates from most states gathered in Philadelphia to draft a new governing framework, moving beyond the weak national government created by the Articles of Confederation. They met at the Pennsylvania State House, which is today Independence Hall, in Philadelphia. The choice of Philadelphia reflects its role as a central, accessible hub for the founding era and the location where the convention convened to design a stronger national government. Other cities played important roles in early American history, but they did not host this convention. New York City hosted earlier government activities, Boston was a major colonial center, and Annapolis hosted an earlier attempt to amend the Articles, but the constitutional convention itself occurred in Philadelphia.

3. From which country did the United States purchase the Louisiana Territory?

This question tests your understanding of who sold the Louisiana Territory to the United States. The United States bought it from France in 1803 for about \$15 million, a deal that roughly doubled the size of the country and paved the way for westward exploration. France, led by Napoleon at the time, agreed to the sale after shifting priorities and financial pressures, making France the seller, not Spain, Britain, or the Netherlands. Spain had controlled parts of the region earlier, but the actual sale in 1803 was from France.

4. Which body conducts impeachment trials in the United States?

Impeachment trials are conducted by the Senate. After the House brings charges and votes to impeach, the Senate takes over to try the case, acting as the jury. For presidential impeachments, the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court presides over the trial. Conviction requires a two-thirds vote in the Senate. The Supreme Court itself does not run impeachment trials, and the President does not oversee the process. That combination—the Senate handling the trial with the Chief Justice presiding in presidential cases—is what makes the Senate the correct answer.

5. Which plan is associated with Roger Sherman as its author?

Representing both large and small states was the central issue. Roger Sherman proposed a two-house legislature: a lower chamber based on population and an upper chamber with equal representation for each state. This structure bridged the competing plans and became known as the Great Compromise. It's also called the Connecticut Compromise because Sherman was from Connecticut, and the plan reflected the state's interests. The Virginia Plan favored representation by population in a bicameral Congress and was associated with Madison and Randolph, while the New Jersey Plan favored equal representation in a single chamber and was proposed by Paterson. So the plan linked to Roger Sherman as its author is the Great Compromise.

6. Who was the commander of the Continental Army during the American Revolution?

The main thing this question is asking is who served as commander of the Continental Army during the American Revolution. George Washington held the role of commander-in-chief for the entire conflict, having been appointed by the Continental Congress in 1775. He guided American forces through early campaigns, endured the hardships of Valley Forge, and secured decisive victories, culminating in the victory at Yorktown in 1781 with French support. His leadership provided the central authority and strategic direction that kept the army united and effective. Thomas Paine wasn't a military commander but a political writer who helped shape public support for independence. Henry Knox was a key general who served as Washington's Chief of Artillery and played important roles in battles, but he did not command the army overall. Nathanael Greene was a capable major general who led forces in the Southern theater, known for his tactical decisions, yet Washington remained the overall commander throughout the war.

7. Name the German mercenaries that the British hired to fight the American colonists during the Revolution.

- A. Teutons

Hessians were the German mercenaries Britain hired to fight the American colonists during the Revolution. They came from the German state of Hesse, especially Hesse-Kassel, and were known for their drill and discipline. Britain recruited them to bolster its forces and avoid relying solely on British troops. This group became the most famous of the foreign troops used in the war, and the term Hessians comes from their Hesse origin. The other options don't fit as well: Teutons is a broad, outdated label for Germans; Mercenaries is too generic a term for the specific group; Prussians refers to troops from a different German state rather than the well-known Hesse contingents.

8. Indentured servants were primarily transported to the New World in exchange for labor.

Indentured servitude worked as a labor-for-passages system. People who could not afford the voyage to the New World agreed to work for a fixed number of years in return for being transported, fed, and housed during the journey and term of service. The colony needed steady labor to grow crops like tobacco and rice, so the promise of labor was what made migration possible and financed the trip. After completing their term, many earned freedom and sometimes minor rewards, but the shipping themselves happened because of the obligation to work. Gold or education weren't the basis for these arrangements, and while land could accompany freedom, it wasn't the reason people were sent in the first place.

9. Which colony was established as a haven for debtors?

- A. North Carolina

Georgia was established as a haven for debtors. In the 1730s, James Oglethorpe and a group of trustees created a colony intended for people imprisoned for debt in Britain to start fresh through honest labor and a responsible use of land. The plan emphasized disciplined living and modest land, with rules designed to prevent old cycles of debt, and the project was pitched as both a humanitarian reform and a strategic buffer against Spanish Florida. This purpose sets Georgia apart from the other colonies, which were mainly founded for economic gain, trade, or settlement rather than as a debtors' refuge. North Carolina, Delaware, and New Jersey grew out of different motives tied to economic opportunity and governance, not debt relief.

10. One qualification for a member of the U.S. House of Representatives is that they must be at least how old?

- A. 21 years old
- B. 35 years old
- C. 25 years old
- D. 30 years old

The question tests the constitutional minimum age to serve in the House. The Constitution sets the age requirement for a member of the House at 25 years old, along with at least seven years of citizenship and being an inhabitant of the state they represent. This specific age was chosen to ensure a basic level of maturity and experience while keeping eligibility relatively accessible compared to the Senate and the Presidency. Among the options, 25 years exactly matches the constitutional rule for the House. The other ages correspond to other offices or contexts: 35 is the presidential minimum, 30 is the Senate minimum, and 21 has been associated with general voting age in various periods but not House eligibility.
