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## **Explanations**

In Rococo interiors, furniture meant to be placed against or along a wall and used as a decorative surface is called a console. A console table is typically shallow in depth, designed to sit close to the wall, and often features elaborate curves and ornamentation that match the style's light, airy feel. It might be paired with a mirror above to emphasize the wall display and overall elegance of the room. The other pieces represent different functions: a bureau is a writing desk with drawers, a place for paper and writing tools; an armoire is a tall cabinet for storage; a commode is a low chest of drawers. None of these are defined by their placement along a wall as a decorative surface, which is why the term console is the best fit.

This contrasts with Donato Bramante and Andrea Palladio, who belong to the High Renaissance, and with Bernini, who is a central Baroque figure but famous for different Roman projects. The building stands as a quintessential demonstration of Borromini's inventive spatial language.

Fresco is a painting technique done on damp plaster—wall decoration, not wood. Tapestry is textile hung on walls, not wood paneling.

This integration helps the room feel cohesive, light, and playful, which is a hallmark of Rococo interiors. Lighting, ceiling decoration, and masonry are important in their own right, but the paneling's purpose in this style is to harmonize with and incorporate furniture, making the furniture feel like an extension of the wall treatment.

The other terms are names of seating furniture—canapé (sofa), chaise longue (long chair), bergère (a fauteuil with a deep, comfortable seat)—which describe where people sit but not the act of watching. So voyeuse best denotes the role of a spectator in Rococo settings.

He is not known primarily as a painter, sculptor, or glassmaker, so the craft most associated with his fame is eboniste—the master of inlaid ebony and metal detailing that defines Boulle marquetry.

Baroque emphasizes drama, movement, and ornate detail, while Rococo is light, playful, and highly ornate with curving forms. None of these match the restrained, classical simplicity of Neoclassical as closely as the console table described.
