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Explanations

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1. Which word means "theoretical; lacking substance"?

- A. Candid
- B. Diverse
- C. Abstract
- D. Temperate

Describing something as theoretical or lacking substance points to ideas that exist in thought rather than in a physical form. Abstract fits because it refers to concepts, principles, or qualities that aren't tied to concrete objects or tangible details. When you encounter abstract, you're hearing about things that are general or speculative, without specific evidence or real-world particulars. The other words describe different traits: candid means frank and honest; diverse means varied; temperate means moderate or self-controlled. Those don't convey the sense of being theoretical or lacking substance, so abstract is the best fit.

So innovating is the best fit because it centers on bringing new things into existence or use.

This item tests emotional steadiness—the idea of staying calm and not easily stirred up. Placidity directly captures that meaning. It's related to calmness in reasoning, but it emphasizes objectivity rather than a naturally tranquil temperament. Fervor means intense, passionate energy or enthusiasm, which is the opposite of being not easily excited. Coquette refers to a flirtatious person, which has nothing to do with emotional steadiness. So placid is the best fit because it uniquely and precisely conveys a steady, untroubled demeanor.

Profuse describes something flowing freely in abundance and also conveys a sense of extravagance in amount or giving. You can say "profuse praise" or "profuse rainfall" to show there is more than enough, almost overflowing. The other words point to limits or thrift: meager and scarce mean not enough, while frugal means being careful and economical, not wasteful. So the word that means both flowing and extravagant is profuse.
